#### **BACKGROUND**

As required by Section 212 of the *Local Government (General) Regulation 2021*, this report contains the details of all monies that Council has invested under Section 625 of the *Local Government Act 1993* dated as at the last day of the reporting month.

In accordance with the *Investment Ministerial Order* dated 12 January 2011, Dubbo Regional Council (Council) may only invest money (on the basis that all investments must be denominated in Australian Dollars) in the following forms of investment:

- a. any public funds or securities issued by or guaranteed by the Commonwealth, any State of the Commonwealth or a Territory;
- b. any debentures or securities issued by a council (within the meaning of the *Local Government Act 1993* (NSW));
- c. interest bearing deposits with, or any debentures or bonds issued by, an authorised deposit taking institution (as defined in the *Banking Act 1959* (Cwth)), but excluding subordinated debt obligations;
- any bill of exchange which has a maturity date of not more the 200 days; and if purchased for value confers on the holder in due course a right of recourse against a bank which has been designated as an authorised deposit-taking institution by the Australian Prudential Regulation Authority;
- e. A deposit with the New South Wales Treasury Corporation or investment in an Hour-Glass investment facility of the New South Wales Treasury Corporation.

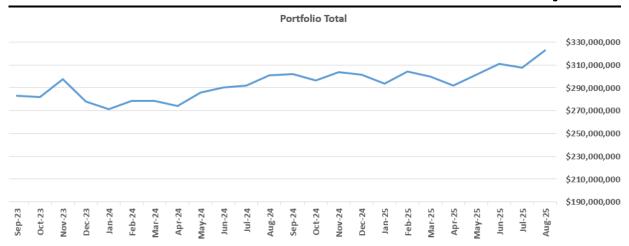
Investments, when placed, have been done so in accordance with the *Local Government Act, Local Government (General) Regulations 2021* and Council's Investment Policy and Strategy. Interest on investment has been accounted for on an accrual basis. This report details investments and annualised returns for the reporting month. 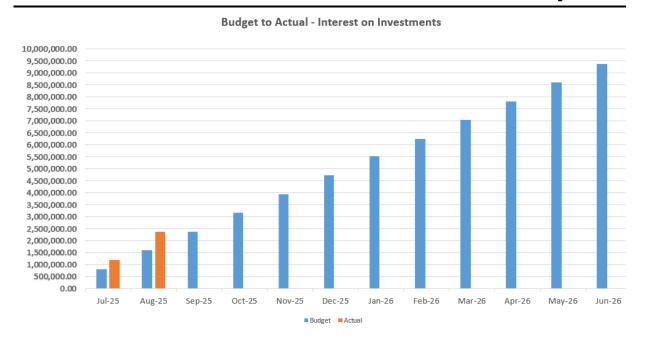

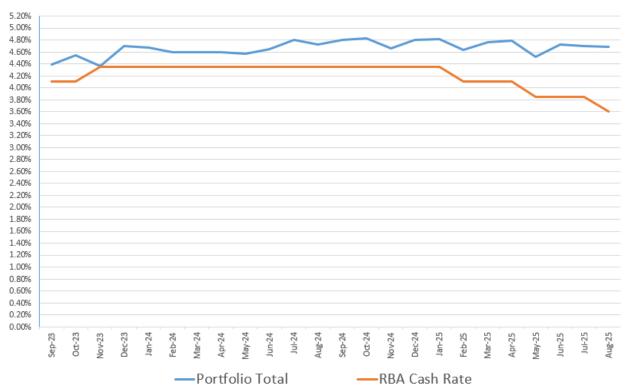

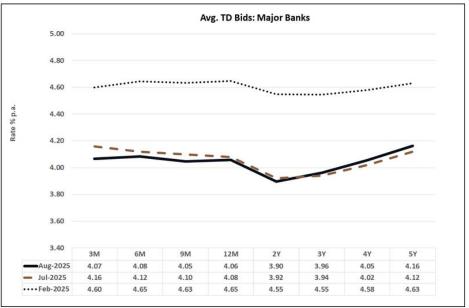

#### Market Update Summary

Global equity markets continued to reach new highs over August, despite the ongoing uncertainty with regards to global tariffs and geopolitics. Markets appear to be buoyed by further central bank rate cuts, or expectations of additional cuts in the short-term. Although the risks to growth remain material, the prospect of further policy support (both monetary and fiscal) is likely to provide support to the medium-term growth outlook and valuations.

In the deposit market, over August, at the short-end of the curve (under 9 months), the average deposit rates offered by the domestic major banks fell ~5bp compared to the previous month (July) after the RBA cut official interest rates. At the longer-end of the curve (1-5 years), the average deposit rates remained relatively flat with the market already largely pricing in additional two rate cuts over the next 6-12 months.

With additional rate cuts and a global economic downturn priced in over the next 6-12 months, investors should consider diversifying and taking an 'insurance policy' against a potentially lower rate environment by investing across 1-5 year fixed deposits and locking in rates close to or above 4% p.a. (small allocation only).

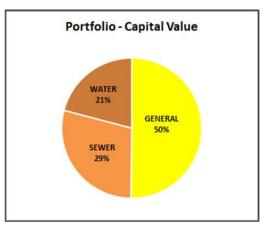

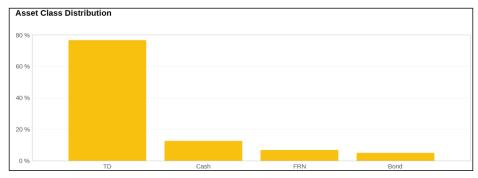

#### **Asset Allocation**

The majority of the portfolio is directed to term deposits (~76%). The remainder of the portfolio is held in senior FRNs (~7%), fixed bonds (~5%) and overnight cash accounts (~12%).



Senior FRNs are currently considered 'expensive' on a historical basis but new issuances should continue to be considered on a case by case scenario. In the interim, staggering a mix of fixed deposits and fixed bonds between 12 months to 5 years remains a more optimal strategy to maximise returns over a longer-term cycle.

With additional interest rate cuts and a global economic downturn being priced in 2025, investors can choose to allocate a small proportion of longer-term funds and undertake an insurance policy against additional rate cuts by investing across 1–5 year fixed assets, locking in and targeting yields above 4% p.a. Should inflation be within the RBA's target band of 2–3% over the longer-term, returns around 4% p.a. or higher should outperform benchmark.

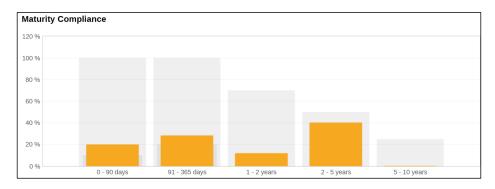
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#### **Term to Maturity**

The investment portfolio remains diversified from a maturity perspective with assets maturing out to 5 years. We recommend surplus funds excess to liquidity requirements be allocated to fixed assets across 1–5 year horizons, as well as any attractive primary FRNs between 3–5 years (refer to respective sections below).

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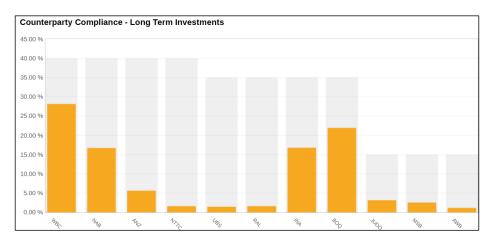

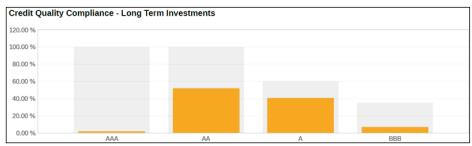

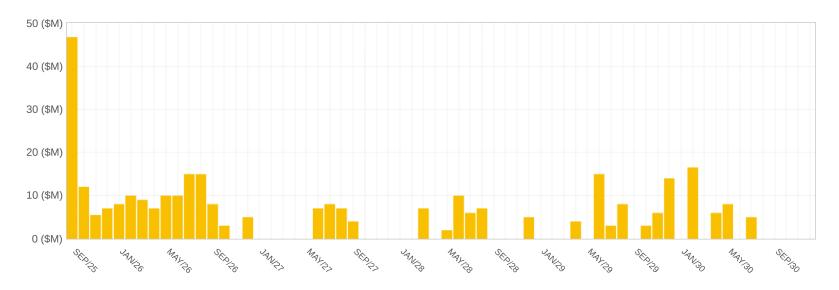

#### **BACKGROUND**

Transport for NSW (TfNSW) is currently constructing a bridge over the Macquarie-Wambuul River as part of the construction of the new alignment of the Newell Highway. The location of the bridge is shown in Image 1 below:



Image 1. New Newell Highway alignment with the bridge crossing the Macquarie-Wambuul River

When a new bridge is constructed, a name is usually determined for the bridge. There are a number of considerations when naming a bridge including the recommendation of a name by the road authority, which is Dubbo Regional Council in this instance, TfNSW as the approving authority and consideration of the Place Naming Policy published by the Geographical Names Board (GNB) of NSW.

It should be noted that the GNB does not play a role in the naming of bridges, however the GNB encourages the naming of bridges to follow the Place Naming Policy published by the GNB. A copy of the policy can be accessed from the link below:

In line with the Place Naming Policy, local government initiate the naming of bridges, other than on a freeway, and TfNSW approve these proposals. TfNSW consider the following in approving the name of a bridge:

- The name has wide community support
- An Aboriginal name has the support of local Aboriginal groups
- Consideration has been given to National and State commemorative initiatives involving the naming of new of key road infrastructure
- The name is consistent with GNB place name criteria
- The design of the name plaque accords with TfNSW requirements.

A request was received from TfNSW to partner with Council on the naming of the New Dubbo Bridge and this was accepted through the resolution of item CCL23/312 at the Ordinary Council meeting held on 23 November 2023.

The approach to the naming process is outlined below:

#### Steps in naming the New Dubbo Bridge Transport for NSW will engage with the local First Nations community to seek suggestions of appropriate First Nations (Wiradjuri) names for the New Dubbo Bridge (phase one consultation). Step 2: A panel of representatives from the local First Nations community will determine a shortlist of Wiradjuri names through a fair and transparent assessment process. Step 3: Transport will invite the wider community to provide feedback on the Wiradjuri names shortlisted by the local First Nations community and/or make other suggestions, which can include suggestions other than First Nations names (phase two consultation). Step 4: Transport will ask representatives from the local First Nations community to assess any further First Nations names suggested during the wider community consultation. Step 5: Transport will collate all bridge name suggestions and a summary of the feedback from the First Nations (phase one) and wider community (phase two) consultation including preferred names into a consultation report for Dubbo Regional Council's consideration. Step 6: Council will review the consultation report, endorse a proposed name for the bridge, and then recommend that bridge name to Transport. Step 7: Transport will approve the name recommended by Council provided that it has community support, is consistent with the NSW Geographical Names Board naming guidelines, and complies with Transport's signage requirements. **Step 8:** The approved bridge name will be jointly announced.

#### **REPORT**

The purpose of this report is for Council to resolve a name for the bridge to be provided to TfNSW for approval.

Based on the resolution of Council at the ordinary Council meeting held on 23 November 2023, the consultation process was tailored to explore a First Nations name for the bridge. The consultation process was split into two phases with the first phase being the exploration of First Nations names developed through consultation with the Aboriginal community.

The first phase of consultation was open from 13 May 2024 until 31 July 2024 with four names developed through the first phase which included:

- Aunty Pearl Gibbs Aboriginal activist and leader who fought for Aboriginal rights for 50 years. She is remembered for her work with the Aborigines Progressive Association, her involvement in the 1938 Day of Mourning, and her community work in Dubbo, NSW.
- Wambuul Macquarie River.
- Bunglegumbie One of the clans of Dubbo.
- Nguluway Meeting each other.

There were a total of 34 submissions in Phase 1 of the consultation process resulting in 24 unique name suggestions. The full list of suggested names from Phase 1 of the consultation phase can be found in Table 5.2.1 of the New Dubbo Bridge naming community consultation summary report (August 2025). A summary of the Wiradjuri names from Phase 1 is also provided below in Table 1:

The second phase of consultation was open from 27 March 2025 to 4 May 2025 and involved wider community involvement. This phase included the voting on the four First Nations names as well as other suggestions for the name of the bridge. There were a total of 440 submissions in Phase 2 of the consultation process.

The community consultation has been completed and a report has been prepared by TfNSW on the naming of the bridge which is include as **Appendix 1** of this report. From the consultation report, the following percentages of votes received for the four First Nations names from Phase 1 of the consultation process is shown in Table 2 below:

Of note from the Phase 2 of the consultation process, there were 106 nominations with James Samuels named or mentioned in the nomination.

<sup>\*</sup>Note that there were 2,500 signatures on a petition which accounts for one submission for the James Samuels' nomination.

Given the direction from Council that there is a preference for a First Nations name relevant to the location and/or function of the bridge such as a crossing place on a river, the four shortlisted First Nations' names have been vetted with checks made in accordance with TfNSW's Asset Naming Evaluation Criteria which includes elements such as cultural significance, validity, regulatory and community support.

Should a name, other than the four names provided in Phase 1 of the community consultation be recommended, then this name would need to be assessed against the Transport Asset Naming Toolkit developed by TfNSW which assesses against criteria including cultural significance, validity, regulatory and community support. A summary of the criteria is provided in Table 5 below:

It is noted that the name to be nominated by Council does not have to be the most popular name contained in the New Dubbo Bridge Naming Community consultation summary report (August 2025).

Advice has also been sought from TfNSW on the dual naming of the bridge with both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal names. It is noted in the report that TfNSW: "does not support dual naming, as Aboriginal naming should not be considered secondary or an afterthought. Additionally, dual naming would complicate navigation and wayfinding, especially for emergency services that rely on clear and consistent place names to respond quickly and effectively."

#### Consultation

- Consultation for the naming of the bridge was undertaken over a period of 12 months and this report is the subject of the consultation process.
- **Appendix 1** contains the consultation that was undertaken for this bridge naming project.

#### **Resourcing Implications**

 Staff time will be required for the preparation of the letter to TfNSW with a recommended name.

#### **Planned Communications**

Updates will be provided through the Your Say page for this project.

#### **Next Steps**

- Following the resolution of Council to nominate a name for the bridge, a letter will be sent to TfNSW for their consideration.
- TfNSW will approve the name should it have community support, is consistent with the GNB naming guidelines and complies with TfNSW's signage requirements. If the name is not approved, Council will be required to submit another name for consideration.
- Upon approval, the bridge name will be jointly announced by Dubbo Regional Council and TfNSW.

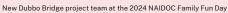

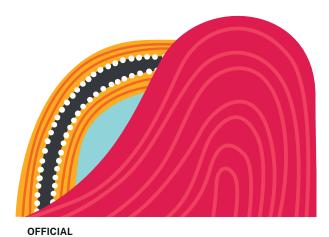

# New Dubbo Bridge-naming

## 1. Introduction

#### 1.1 Purpose of this report

This report outlines the public consultation process carried out by Transport for NSW (Transport) for naming the bridge as part of the Newell Highway Upgrade – New Dubbo Bridge project. Throughout the process, Transport collaborated with key internal and external stakeholders, including community and Dubbo Regional Council.

Feedback was gathered from residents, businesses, and stakeholders in the Dubbo Regional Local Government Areas (LGA).

The report summarises the community and stakeholder engagement activities and the feedback received, which will assist Dubbo Regional Council in recommending a name for the bridge to Transport.

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#### 1.2 Background

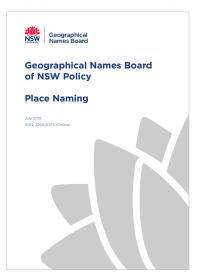
The Newell Highway Upgrade – New Dubbo Bridge project is jointly funded by the Australian and NSW Governments. Transport, in partnership with Dubbo Regional Council (Council) and the Dubbo community, will name the New Dubbo Bridge. Naming major bridges provides a useful navigational reference for motorists and allows the community to recognise and celebrate cultural, historical, and social connections in the region.

Naming a Transport asset is a significant and important opportunity, leaving a legacy for generations to come. Transport is guided by the Geographical Names Board (GNB), which ensures that names are consistent, culturally sensitive, and reflective of the community's heritage and values. This collaborative effort aims to honour the region's identity and history while providing practical benefits for navigation and community pride.

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At the Council Ordinary meeting held on Thursday, 23 November 2023, they resolved:

- that Council's preferred name for the New Dubbo Bridge would be a First Nations name relevant to the location and/or function of the bridge, such as a crossing place on a river.
- that this resolution of Council would be the focus of the community consultation undertaken by Transport for NSW.

Transport supports Council's resolution to recognise the significance of First Nations heritage in the project footprint and to celebrate the considerable First Nations participation on the project.

Transport believes that Council, as elected representatives of the community they serve, is best placed to recommend a suitable name from the suggestions received during community consultation.

Transport does not support dual naming, as Aboriginal naming should not be considered secondary or an afterthought. Additionally, dual naming would complicate navigation and wayfinding, especially for emergency services that rely on clear and consistent place names to respond quickly and effectively.

Given the significant public interest in this bridge, Transport carried out an extensive consultation process to select a name for the bridge, engaging both external and internal stakeholders, and in consultation with Council and the Aboriginal community.

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# 2. Consultation approach

#### 2.1 Values

Transport's values underpin our decisions and behaviours when working with colleagues, customers, communities, stakeholders, and partners.

- **Customer focus** We place the customer at the centre of everything we do
- Collaboration We value each other and create better outcomes by working together
- Solutions We deliver sustainable and innovative solutions to NSW's transport needs
- Integrity We take responsibility and communicate openly
- Safety We prioritise safety for our people and our customers.

# 2.2 Consultation objectives

Transport consulted with the community and key stakeholders in Dubbo Regional Local Government Areas (LGA) during the consultation period with the aim to:

- gather community feedback on the naming of the New Dubbo Bridge, with a focus on selecting a First Nations name relevant to the location and/or function of the bridge
- ensure inclusivity and representation by engaging a diverse range of community members, including First Nations people, local residents, and other stakeholders
- educate and inform the community about the cultural, historical, and social significance of the bridge naming process
- foster community ownership and pride in the new bridge and its name
- ensure transparency and fairness in the consultation process
- comply with the NSW Geographical Names Board (GNB) Place Naming Policy and other relevant guidelines

 document and report all feedback and suggestions received during the consultation process for consideration by Dubbo Regional Council and Transport for NSW.

# 2.3 Roles and Responsibilities:

Transport worked closely with Council in planning the consultation process to identify clear roles and responsibilities which are outlined below:

#### · Transport will:

- conduct community consultation and prepare a comprehensive engagement report for Council's consideration
- approve the name recommended by Council, provided it aligns with the NSW Geographical Names Board naming guidelines, has been reviewed and meets the requirements of Transports bridge naming assessment tool and complies with Transport's signage requirements.

#### Council will:

 review the consultation report, endorse a proposed name for the bridge, and recommend that name to Transport.

# 2.4 Extensive planning and community consultation

Transport undertook a comprehensive and collaborative approach to develop the consultation process for naming the bridge. This involved extensive planning, research, and engagement with key stakeholders to ensure a thorough and inclusive process. The goal was to develop a naming framework that respected local traditions, particularly those of the Aboriginal community, and reflected the community's preferences.

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# 2.5 Development and implementation of the process

#### 1. Initial research and planning June/ July 2023:

- Research: Transport carried out initial research on previous bridge naming processes to understand best practices and potential challenges.
- Internal meetings: Meetings were held with key internal stakeholders to discuss the process and establish guidelines, including a preference for an Aboriginal name in line with Council's resolution and the Geographical Names Board (GNB) policy.
- Engagement design insights from local First Nation's representatives: Transport met with representatives from the Dubbo Aboriginal Working Party committee to brief them on the proposed consultation approach and seek early endorsement and feedback. Their insights and suggestions are invaluable as we move forward with the planning and development of the bridge naming process.

## 2. Engagement with Council August 2023 – Early 2024:

- Proposal letter: Transport sent a letter to Council outlining the proposed bridge naming process, including advice on engaging with Aboriginal communities.
- Council agreement: Council agreed to follow Transport for NSW's bridge naming policy, and the use of local Aboriginal language groups.
- Council resolution: Council passed a naming resolution at an Ordinary Meeting on the 23 November 2023, preferring a First Nations name relevant to the location.
- Process presentation: Transport presented the proposed process to the Council's Customer Experience and Engagement team, leading to an agreement on the process and timeline for further community engagement.

- Communication collateral: Transport drafted and circulated a communication collateral pack for internal review, incorporating feedback and providing it to Council for review and discussion.
   Council approved the content with minor layout changes.
- Bridge naming assessment tool: In consultation with Council and the Dubbo Aboriginal Community Working party, Transport developed an assessment tool to support the First Nations assessment panel and Council to assess the bridge names proposed by the community.

### 3. Community consultation March 2024 – May 2025:

- First Nations engagement: Transport engaged the First Nations community, seeking suggestions for appropriate Wiradjuri names.
- Shortlisting names: A panel of representatives from the local First Nations community used the bridge naming assessment tool to create a shortlist of Wiradjuri names.
- Wider community feedback: The wider community was invited to provide feedback on the shortlisted Wiradjuri names and/or suggest other names.

## 4. Final review and announcement May 2025 – Bridge opening:

- Compilation of suggestions (we are here): Transport compiled all naming suggestions into this Community Consultation Report for the Council's consideration.
- Council review: Council will review this report, endorse a proposed name, and recommend it to Transport.
- Approval and announcement: Transport will approve the recommended name if it has community support, is aligned with the naming guidelines and meets the signage requirements. Transport and Council will jointly announce the approved bridge name when the bridge is open.

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#### 2.6 Assessment tool for bridge naming

The assessment tool for naming the New Dubbo Bridge outlines the evaluation criteria for both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal name options suggested during consultation. The tool was developed in consultation with the Dubbo Aboriginal Community Working Party and Council, the criteria in the assessment tool ensures that names are culturally significant, validated by relevant experts, and supported by substantial evidence.

#### Criteria for Aboriginal Names:

- Consultation with experts: Names must be reviewed by Aboriginal cultural/language experts, Elders, Custodians and local Aboriginal businesses.
- Cultural Significance: Names should reflect the cultural heritage and historical significance of the local Aboriginal community.

#### Criteria for non-Aboriginal names:

- Validation: Names must be validated by relevant associations and Government agencies.
- Risk Assessment: The tool includes a risk assessment to avoid conflicts with existing names, ensuring names are respectful and non-discriminatory.

#### Compliance and Support

- Guidelines compliance: Names must comply with the Transport Asset Naming Toolkit, Geographical Names Board Guidelines and Transport signage requirements.
- Community support: Names must have endorsement from Council and substantial evidence of community support.

#### 2.7 Consultation methods

To ensure a thorough and inclusive consultation process for naming the bridge, and in line with Council's resolution, Transport implemented a phased community engagement approach.

The first phase involved targeted engagement with the First Nations communities followed by second phase which involved wider community consultation

Various engagement methods were used to gather feedback and suggestions, ensuring diverse participation and comprehensive input from all stakeholders.

To support the consultation process, several tools and resources were developed:

- Have Your Say online engagement portal:

- Phone and email: project 1800 number and email for enquiries and feedback, listed on all engagement materials.

To ensure widespread awareness and participation, various promotional activities were undertaken:

- Media releases: regular updates sent to local media outlets to keep the community informed
- Community Updates and flyers: distributed throughout the community to promote engagement opportunities
- Social media campaigns: utilised to reach a broader audience and encourage online participation.

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# New Dubbo Bridge-naming

### Transport for NSW

#### Phase 1: Targeted First Nations consultation (May - July 2024)

To start the naming process, Transport worked closely with the local First Nations community to gather suggestions for appropriate Wiradjuri names for the bridge.

Transport held several meetings with a local working group composed of Wiradjuri elders and community leaders. These meetings provided a platform for in depth discussions about the cultural and historical importance of potential names. The working group played a key role in guiding the consultation process and ensuring that the names suggested were culturally appropriate and meaningful.

In line with Council's resolution, Transport also engaged with the wider First Nations community to seek other suggestions. This included a targeted communications campaign encouraging members of the local First Nations Community to have their say. Activities included distribution of the engagement collateral to key community hubs, attending events where this target audience would be reached and paid social media campaign with a curated video targeting the First Nation members of the community.

The below table outlines the engagement methods and communication tools utilised during the Phase 1 consultation.

Following the close of the first phase of consultation, Transport met with a panel of local First Nations representatives to determine a shortlist of Wiradjuri names through a fair and transparent assessment process. This shortlist of Wiradjuri names was then used as part of the next phase of consultation – phase 2.

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#### Phase 2: Wider community consultation (March - May 2025)

During this phase, the wider community was invited to provide suggestions for the bridge name, including the Wiradjuri names shortlisted by the local First Nations community. Suggestions other than First Nations names were also welcomed.

The consultation was promoted via a range of communication channels to target key stakeholder groups and individuals, as well as promoting the opportunity for the wider community to provide feedback via the online channels and street stalls in Dubbo.

#### **Assessment Process**

A panel of local First Nations representatives conducted a fair and transparent assessment process to determine a shortlist of Wiradjuri names. The panel consisted of representatives from the local Aboriginal Working Party, experts in Aboriginal language, spelling and meanings, Council, Dubbo Historical Society and Transport.

The panel reviewed all suggested Wiradjuri names in Phase 1 and in agreement identified four shortlisted names as listed below:

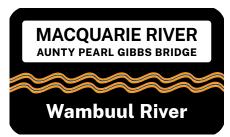

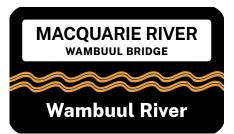

- Joint announcement: The approved bridge name will be jointly announced by Transport and the Council when the bridge opens.

# 1. Proposed Boree Solar Farm State Significant Development

The proposed Boree Solar Farm is a 250 megawatt solar farm with 200 megawatt/800 megawatt hour battery energy storage system and associated infrastructure. The Scoping Report for the proposed Boree Solar Farm project indicates the main components as the following:

- Photovoltaic Arrays including the siting of up to 600,000 PV modules on housing arrays;
- Transmission Works including direct connection into the existing Essential Energy 132kV network which traverses the Project site and the construction of a new 132kV collector substation;
- Ancillary infrastructure including internal access roads, utilities and communications infrastructure, operation and maintenance compounds, hardstands, switchyard;
- Temporary facilities including site construction compounds and construction power supply.

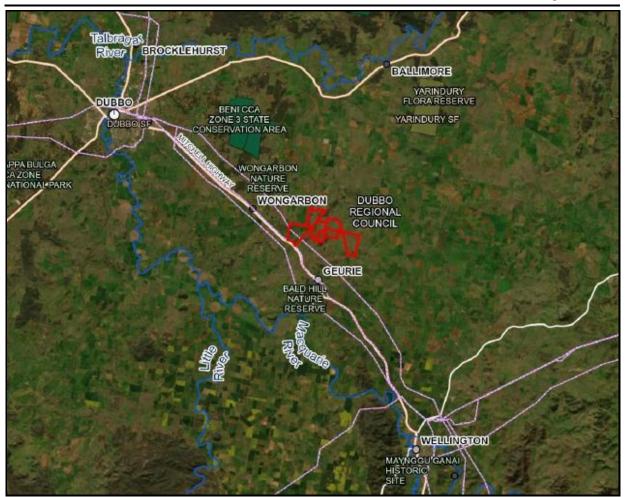


Figure 1: Locality Plan

A general locality plan, which shows the proposed location of the development is shown in Figure 1.

## 2. Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements

Council received correspondence from the NSW Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure (Department) dated 14 August 2025 regarding the preparation of Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements for the development.

Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARs) identify what information needs to be included in the Environmental Impact Statement and the studies and reports required.

Council was notified on 9 September 2025 that the Department had issued the SEARs for the Boree Solar Farm project. This is because the Department has a requirement for SEARs to be provided to a development proponent within 28 days of the acceptance of a Scoping Report for a project. A copy of the issued SEARs is provided here in **Appendix 1.** 

Following issuing of the SEARs, further consultation has been undertaken with the Department. The Department provided information that Council's submission will be provided to Venn Energy as the development proponent to address as part of the Environmental Impact Statement. In addition, Council's submission will also appear on the NSW Planning Portal as an Agency submission at the SEARs stage of the project.

Internal Council Departments have undertaken a review of the Scoping Report for the project. Council's draft submission for the current SEARs stage of the project is provided here in **Appendix 2**.

In addition, submissions from the Stop the Boree Solar Farm Community Group are provided here in **Appendix 3 and Appendix 4**. In undertaking consultation with community through the project, Council made a commitment to the community group for their submission to be provided with Council's SEARs submission. This is because there is no clear step for a community group to have input into a project at the SEARs stage.

# 3. Next Steps

Council's submission in **Appendix 2**, the submission from the Stop the Boree Solar Farm Community Group in **Appendix 3 and Appendix 4**, in addition to the resolutions of Council will be provided to the Department and the Proponent.

If the project continues through to the Environmental Impact Statement stage, Council's draft submission will also be provided to a Council meeting for consideration. At the Environmental Impact Statement stage, the project effectively becomes an application for development. At this stage, Council will be able to determine an organisation response in respect of the project, in addition to any issues of concern or otherwise with the Environmental Impact Statement.

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- unless Conservation Programs, Heritage and Regulation Group (CPHR) and the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure (DPHI) determine the proposed development is not likely to have any significant impacts on biodiversity values;
- an assessment of the likely impacts on listed aquatic threatened species, populations or ecological communities, scheduled under the Fisheries Management Act 1994, and a description of the measures to minimise and rehabilitate impacts;
- a cumulative impact assessment of biodiversity values in the region from nearby developments; and
- if an offset is required, details of the measures proposed to address the offset obligations.

#### Heritage - including:

- a landscape and visual impact assessment, prepared in accordance with the Large-Scale Solar Guideline and the Technical Supplement – Landscape and Visual Impact Assessment;
- a detailed assessment of the likely visual impacts of all components of the project on surrounding residences (including approved developments, lodged development applications and dwelling entitlements), and key locations, scenic of significant vistas and road corridors in the public domain:
- details of measures to mitigate and/or manage potential impacts (including a draft landscaping plan for on-site perimeter planting, with evidence it has been developed in consultation with affected landowners);
- detailed consideration on the Siding Spring Observatory in accordance with the Dark Sky Planning Guideline (2023).

Glint and Glare – provide a glint and glare assessment prepared in accordance with the Large-Scale Solar Guideline and supporting Technical Supplement – Landscape and Visual Impact Assessment

#### Noise - includina:

- an assessment of the construction noise impacts (including impacts from proposed road upgrades) of the development in accordance with the Interim Construction Noise Guideline (ICNG), operational noise impacts in accordance with the NSW Noise Policy for Industry (2017), assess traffic noise having regard to the NSW Road Noise Policy (DECCW, 2011) and cumulative noise impacts (considering other developments in the area), including (where appropriate):
  - identification of impacts associated with construction, site emission and traffic generation at noise affected sensitive receivers, including the provision of operational noise contours:
  - details of noise monitoring survey, background noise levels and

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- amenity noise levels at the most-affected residential receivers;

I refer to your correspondence dated 14 August 2025 regarding the preparation of SEARs for the abovementioned project and the opportunity for Council to provide input into the project.

Council provides the following information in respect of the project:

### 1. Consideration by Council

Council at its meeting on 23 September 2025 considered this response in respect of the proposed Boree Solar Farm and resolved as follows:

#### 2. Community and stakeholder consultation

Council prioritises transparent communication, regular engagement, and ensuring that community voices are heard early in the planning process. We are advocating to the NSW Government for a more coordinated approach to project rollouts to avoid overwhelming local capacity and ensuring community fatigue and growing resistance to projects is managed in a holistic manner.

Council had an introductory meeting with the proponent in April 2025 where they were encouraged to have a community meeting/s to allow our community to seek information around both the project and the State Significant Development process. Council has also advocated that the Proponent should have a local presence on the ground or a structured local attendance regime. This would enable more effective communication with our community, which should be via face to face means and not electronic or video conferencing methods.

The NSW State Significant Development system and process is complex and community members need access to easy to understand information on the role of a project proponent, State Government and Council in the State Significant Development process.

Once a project has been announced by a Proponent, community turn to local government for guidance on the process and importantly, how to actively and productively participate in the planning process.

Council conducted a community information session in July 2025 to provide information on the following:

- The Central West Orana Renewable Energy Zone;
- What is a Renewable Energy Zone project;
- · The State Significant Development process;
- · How and when a submission can be made and to what body; and
- · Council's role in the process.

Council's expectation for this project is for the developer Venn Energy to prioritise structured face to face consultation with potentially impacted residents in a meaningful and direct way, in addition to ensuring project information is available in a timely fashion in locations where all members of the community can access.

I can also advise that in this regard, Council is currently preparing a dedicated page on Council's YourSay engagement platform for renewable energy projects, in addition to providing information in Customer Service Centres. The aim of this information is also to further educate our community on being active participants in the planning process for such projects.

#### 3. The proposed development

The Scoping Report indicates that the following buildings, structures and facilities will be provided for the initial construction and future operation of the development:

- Up to 600,000 solar PV panels mounted on tracking systems.
- A BESS with an indicative capacity of up to 200 MW 4-hours.
- Operation and maintenance compounds which will include offices and equipment storage facilities.
- Control building.
- Transmission cables/powerlines, invertor stations and associated facilities.
- High voltage substation.

In regard to the above buildings, structures and facilities, there are no site plan(s) indicating set-out and the distances from the allotment boundaries, site plan(s) of the proposed office and storage shed compounds and floor plans and elevations for the proposed permanent buildings and facilities.

On previous occasions with proposed SSD's, Council has identified the lack of detail associated with the permanent buildings associated with the development, particularly the operations and maintenance buildings. No floor plans, elevation and site plans are provided.

The construction of such buildings or structures will likely require the approval of a construction certificate, and for Council or a private certifier to issue a construction certificate, the approval needs to include concept plans as a minimum.

As such, it is recommended that the *General Requirements* of the SEARs be embellished to specifically require the submission of such plans, diagrams and relevant documentation.

#### 4. Crown building work

The Scoping Report identifies that the development will require the installation of an electrical substation with HV transformer, switchgear, switch room and control room. These works would presumably become assets of either Essential Energy or TransGrid. Under the EP&A Act, Essential Energy and TransGrid would both constitute the Crown and their work would be Crown building work and would not require a construction certificate. Further, their work would generally be 'Development without Consent' under State Environmental Planning Policy (Transport & Infrastructure).

The EIS is required to address the requirements of the various applicable statutes, the required EIS should identify the works associated with the development that will be undertaken as Crown building work for the purposes of section 6.28 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act, 1979.

It would be beneficial for all parties involved (i.e. the proponent, contractors, utility providers and Council), that the EIS identifies works in the development which will constitute Crown building work and those that must be the subject of a construction certificate.

#### 5. Social impacts

A Social Impact Assessment must be prepared for the development in accordance with applicable guidelines of the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure.

The Social Impact Assessment must ensure social equity of the community effected by the proposed development is maintained or enhanced, both now and into the future. It should identify and address a range of social issues, including population change, provision of facilities and services (including recreation, cultural and social), the increased need for essential workers to accommodate the additional population (including healthcare, educational and childcare professionals), local economic impacts, the needs of particular groups and people, and displacement of particular groups.

As part of the Social Impact Assessment, the required community and stakeholder consultation should be in accordance with applicable Guidelines and not be a 'tick a box' approach.

#### 6. Planning Agreement

Council's Renewable Energy Benefit Framework provides guidance to proponents about Council's requirements to deliver benefits to our community through planning agreements. It provides a clear and transparent way to govern the negotiation, assessment and use of planning agreements, and ensures they are applied in a consistent, efficient, fair and accountable way. It requires proponents of solar development to provide \$850 per megawatt per annum to Council, with payment of funds as annual payments from the commencement of construction.

Any planning agreement would need to ensure the funding and benefits are directed towards villages surrounding the project, and the broader Dubbo urban area. Council will utilise funds received to benefit the community in one or more of the following ways (but may not be limited to):

- Road infrastructure provision and maintenance;
- · Housing opportunities and initiatives;
- Strategic planning;
- Economic development and investment attraction opportunities and initiatives;
- Skills development;
- Community facilities and recreation opportunities;
- Youth welfare and support;
- Town centre development and maintenance in Wellington; or

 Other infrastructure provision that provides for the continued health, wellbeing and development of the community.

The proponent should identify a range of public purposes that align with our Framework and could be considered for inclusion in a planning agreement. It is important that specific organisations/entities aren't identified or given favourable treatment as Council needs to act fairly, ethically and without bias in the interests of the local community.

The Planning Agreement must also not be used to offset the primary development impacts.

#### 7. Workforce accommodation

Accommodation and employment impacts need to be considered and addressed early and ongoing throughout the project planning process. This issue cannot be left to preparation of a Construction Workforce and Accommodation Strategy post-approval.

There are currently 23 renewable energy projects either proposed, in the planning process or in operation in the Dubbo Regional Local Government Area. We need to ensure that appropriate accommodation solutions are examined and planned as part of this project. This must include an analysis of multiple accommodation options, with an analysis of why these options were or weren't pursued further. Proponents must not rely entirely on motels, hotels or Airbnb accommodation, as this may negatively impact tourism and existing rental markets.

Council has an established policy setting for workforce accommodation to be provided within or in close proximity to existing urban areas and villages to ensure they have a positive and long-lasting legacy for these communities. This approach would allow:

- Infrastructure to be appropriately converted and used for future and permanent residential accommodation
- Allow for the natural expansion of urban areas and villages after decommissioning of accommodation
- Ensure there are no unreasonable impacts to Council on extending infrastructure to service new development in unserviced areas
- Allow workers to integrate into the community rather than being isolated in a rural
  area, which provides appropriate structures to allow the Region to capture a
  percentage of the temporary workforce as permanent residents in the future.

# 8. Infrastructure and traffic

In respect of the traffic and infrastructure impacts, the EIS is required to include the following:

 A detailed Traffic Impact Assessment for the project, which is prepared in close consultation with Dubbo Regional Council and Transport for NSW.

- In consultation with Council, the Traffic Impact Assessment needs to identify the overall transport route from port to the project. This should include one clear option and not a number or range of options.
- Council's preference for the project is for State and Regional classified roads be utilised for the transport route where possible and for use of local roads to be minimised.
- The Traffic Impact Assessment needs to adequately consider the function and safety
  of local roads for all road users. This includes ensuring school bus routes are
  adequately considered in the assessment.
- The Traffic Impact Assessment needs to clearly indicate proposed site access locations and articulate why these locations were chosen, in addition to a technical and safety assessment of these locations.
- Details of all road and intersection upgrades need to be included for the overall route to site access locations.
- The Traffic Impact Assessment should also clearly delineate what route/s to the site
  will be used for light vehicles through to oversize and over mass vehicles, including
  projected traffic volumes.
- The Traffic Impact Assessment should also include measures that will be undertaken to improve the safety of all road users.

#### 8. Flooding and overland flow impacts

Given the undulating nature of the project site, Council has received concerns from community that runoff from the development will enter local watercourse system (creeks) and create downstream flooding impacts in Geurie and Wongarbon.

Council has prepared detailed flood studies for both Geurie and Wongarbon. As part of the EIS, the proponent needs to undertake a detailed assessment of the project on the integrity of the flood studies and if required in consultation with Council, undertake new studies, which include any impacts from the proposed development.

#### 9. Visual impact assessment

The Proponent will be required to prepare a Visual Impact Assessment in accordance with the requirements of the Department. This assessment should be prepared to provide the visual perspective/s of the project from each sensitive receiver to the project and included in the assessment. This information should also be made publicly available as part of the FIS

As part of the Visual Impact Assessment, any vegetation screening areas must be clearly articulated, including species and the management regime for the vegetation. Any vegetation should be planted early and be maintained in perpetuity.

### 10. Agri-solar report

The land is currently zoned RU1 Primary Production under the provisions of the Dubbo Regional Local Environmental Plan 2022 and is used for agricultural purposes. Council has an expectation with solar farm developments that some agricultural use can continue on the land in conjunction with the proposed solar farm.

In this regard, Council requires an Agri-Solar Assessment Report to be prepared by a suitably qualified and experienced professional. Council also has an expectation that the agricultural use activities included in the report will be undertaken on the land.

#### Re: Objection to Venn Energy Boree Solar Project Scoping Report (SSD-90792956)

Dear Minister Scully

We write to formally lodge our objections to the Boree Solar Project Scoping Report, prepared for Venn Energy Pty Ltd by Eco Logical Australia Pty Ltd¹. After carefully reviewing the document, we have identified significant deficiencies, inconsistencies, and omissions that render the report inadequate as a basis for progressing to the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) stage.

Our objections are outlined in two separate reports (1) this document; and (2) a separate, more detailed report on the less than adequate engagement, consultation and communication practices of Venn Energy.

#### Disclaimer (Page i)

The disclaimer states the report was prepared under "time and budgetary constraints imposed by the client." This raises serious concerns about the adequacy of the assessments, given that such limitations may compromise quality, rigour, and compliance with NSW Government expectations for SSD projects.

#### Overview (Page 1)

- Exclusion of Wongarbon: Wongarbon, a village located just 4.8 km from the project site, is not included in the overview.
   This is misleading, as residents were issued project introduction letters in April, and Wongarbon is referenced elsewhere in the report.
- Collector Substation: The 132 kV collector substation is identified here and on the Venn Energy Boree Solar Project website
   (<a href="https://boreesolarproject.com.au/the-project/">https://boreesolarproject.com.au/the-project/</a>) but was not disclosed to landholders at the April project briefing sessions,
  nor was it communicated by other means.
- Battery Energy Storage System (BESS): The overview refers to a "DC coupled decentralised BESS," yet no explanation of this
  technology is included in the abbreviations (pages ii and iii). At briefings, this was not explained. Since then, BESS capacity
  has increased, and notification was limited to an autogenerated email titled "project website live," which is wholly
  inadequate.
- Inverters: The overview omits inverters from the listed "main components," even though 54 inverters are identified later in the report (Page 22). This internal inconsistency undermines confidence in the document's accuracy.

## Regional Context of the Project (Page 4)

The map (Figure 1-1 Regional Context of the Project) is identical to that provided in the April introductory letter. Map is small and provides insufficient context for affected landholders, communities and decision-makers.

#### **Project Location Context (Page 13)**

Wongarbon is again omitted, despite its clear proximity and the project's potential impacts on the village and its residents.

#### Mapping and Site Data (Pages 4, 5, 15 and Page 9 in Preliminary Social Impact Assessment)

- Outdated mapping: Figure 2-2 (Page 15) is based on 2017 data and omits current residential and farm infrastructure.
- Poor clarity: Maps are small and use colour schemes that obscure information (Figure 1-2: Project Layout page 5).
- Waterways: First- and second-order streams are not identified, despite feeding third- and fourth-order streams.
- Dams and bores: Several dams, contour banks, and bores are missing or misrepresented.
- Subterranean water: Soaks and springs, including those identified by local irrigation specialists, are not acknowledged.
- Ethos Urban Preliminary Social Impact Assessment Boree Solar Farm Figure 3 Social Locality has the township of
  Geurie located in the project site, and the township of Wongarbon directly north of the project site. This is completely
  inaccurate.

#### Key Risks and Hazards (Page 16)

- The report states that the project site has a reduced flooding risk due to no "major watercourses." However, site maps clearly show 1st–3rd order streams and flow lines.
- No assessment is provided of increased runoff from impermeable solar panels into downstream flood-prone areas such as Geurie, despite Dubbo Regional Council investing heavily in a flood study for Geurie.

#### Project Description (Pages 22-23)

- · The project description is inconsistent with the Overview section, undermining clarity and transparency.
- Local roads around the site (Albion Hills Road, Firbank Road, and Westella Road) deteriorate rapidly in wet weather. This is not acknowledged despite foreseeable heavy construction traffic.
- No assessment is made of traffic interactions with school buses, cyclists, or local road users, or how conflicts will be managed to an acceptable safety standard.

#### Rehabilitation and Decommissioning (Page 23)

- The scoping report provides an inadequate rehabilitation proposal. The suggestion to place a layer of topsoil over retained
  or cut-off piles is a cosmetic fix, not a functional restoration. It does not rebuild the original soil profile or land capability:
  the subsoil which governs root penetration, drainage and machinery traffic remains compacted and obstructed (by piles,
  conduits, footings), leaving infiltration, plant establishment and cultivation impaired. Without removing sub-surface
  obstructions and restoring subsoil structure and hydrology, the land cannot credibly be said to be returned to its former
  agricultural capability or productivity.
- Only above-ground infrastructure is mentioned as part of being decommissioned, yet underground transmission lines are acknowledged elsewhere.
- No mention of waste management, spoil disposal, or who bears the financial burden.
- Key concerns include:
  - o Ambiguity around "plough depth": What does this mean, and how deep is it?
  - o Does "plough depth" allow for deep ripping, poly pipe installation, or cropping practices?
  - $\circ \quad \text{Risk of leaving contaminants (concrete, wiring, steel) that may sterilise land for future use.} \\$
  - $\circ\quad$  No clarity on rehabilitation of shallow soils, crests, or erosion-prone areas.
  - o Unclear responsibility for stump holes, waste removal, or cost recovery.

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In addition, there is a serious inconsistency between the public-facing website and the statutory scoping report.

On the website, Venn Energy promotes an "industry-leading decommissioning regime," describing it as a core principle of responsible stewardship. The website promises that:

- The project owner is legally obligated to fully decommission the project and return the land to its original condition.
- A dedicated decommissioning fund will be established during the project's operational life, based on a third-party independent cost assessment.
- The fund will be accessible to host landowners if the project owner fails to decommission, ensuring landholders and the
  community never bear the cost.
- · Recycling will be prioritised, with confidence expressed in advancing technologies that allow most materials to be reused.
- These commitments provide "peace of mind" to landholders and the surrounding community that decommissioning will always occur.
- When asked, Venn Energy was unable to provide details on its "core environmental values" or what "best practice" decommissioning would look like.

By contrast, the Boree Solar Farm Scoping Report reduces decommissioning to vague statements that:

- All above-ground infrastructure will be dismantled and removed "if the project is approved."
- PV piles would be cut back below ploughing depth or buried under topsoil.
- Compressors and rock crushers may be needed to cut piles.
- Internal roads would only be removed if not needed for fire or farming access.
- A Decommissioning and Rehabilitation Management Plan will be prepared later, with no mention of funding, independent
  oversight, or binding guarantees.

This divergence between the promotional material and the statutory planning document is misleading. The website language is designed to reassure landholders, yet the formal scoping report omits or weakens these very commitments. Such inconsistency undermines transparency, raises doubt about enforceability, and places landholders at risk of being left with remediation costs if the proponent fails to act.

Until the Scoping Report explicitly incorporates the same binding decommissioning commitments as those promoted on the website — including the independent fund, clear recycling obligations, and enforceable responsibilities — it cannot be considered adequate or compliant with NSW planning requirements.

## Site Access (Page 23)

The statement that only "minor road upgrades" may be required is unsupported and inconsistent with on-ground constraints. The proposed access points are narrow, timbered rural roads that function as biodiversity/wildlife corridors and are not adequate for heavy construction traffic and OSOM deliveries without substantial widening, tree removal, verge excavation and intersection works. Labelling these impacts as "minor" masks the real scale of clearing and habitat fragmentation that would result; such works would also trigger additional environmental assessment and approvals that have not been addressed. The claim that all candidate approaches are "approved NSW OSOM roads" does not resolve local-road constraints, which govern the last kilometres into the site. Any modifications to these local roadways and timbered corridors also changes the "sense of place" for residents whom travel and use these roads on a daily basis.

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#### Workforce and Accommodation (Page 24)

The report estimates 350 workers but provides no details of housing, transport, or workforce impacts on the local community (e.g., rental availability, worker transport arrangements, traffic peaks, parking, amenity).

#### Project Design Development and Alternatives (pages 26 & 27)

The Scoping Report's own tables and figures show the Development Footprint (981 ha) set within a Project Site (1,322 ha)—i.e., roughly three-quarters of the entire site—yet no maps reserve or depict separation areas (riparian corridors, APZ/defendable space, setbacks to dwellings/roads, or boundary standoffs). The "preliminary layout" is explicitly described as indicative and subject to change, but with a footprint this large and no dimensioned buffers shown, the report does not demonstrate how impacts are being avoided rather than deferred to the EIS.

Accordingly, we refute the statements that the design has "located infrastructure away from sensitive areas and receivers" and that it "responds to identified environmental impacts and constraints," because the documentation provides no visible buffer framework to substantiate those claims. The report cites design principles (p. 27) but does not translate them into mapped, measurable buffers; it lists only broad avoidances (e.g., "large watercourses" and AHIMS sites) and says any interference with watercourses will merely "consider" NSW riparian-corridor guidance without applying the required corridor widths on the layout.

#### Noise and Vibration (Page 67)

Construction methods and feasibility: Construction activities such as pile driving must be assessed with activity-specific studies. Given the site's slopes, shallow rock and hidden rock shelves near watercourses, conventional pile driving is likely impracticable in many areas and may require pre-drilling, rock drilling or drill-and-blast, with corresponding design modifications. Piling into rock will transmit higher noise and ground-borne vibration over greater distances to sensitive receptors; the proponent must either avoid these areas or adopt low-impact foundation methods with verified noise/vibration limits and mitigation.

#### Traffic and Cumulative Transport Impacts (Page 87; see also Page 17)

The Scoping Report states that "traffic volume data suggests that both the Mitchell Highway and Golden Highway currently carry a low to medium level and traffic in line with their function and classification as state roads." This is misleading, incomplete, and inconsistent with parliamentary evidence presented to the NSW Legislative Council Inquiry into the Impact of REZ (16 May 2025).

#### Key evidence:

- Current Golden Highway volumes: approximately 1,600 vehicle movements/day (west of Merriwa).
- Transmission project alone: approximately 2,000 vehicle movements/day.
- Each renewable project: up to 200 vehicle movements/day.
- With about 50 projects: cumulative increase of up to 10,000 vehicles/day, a 500% increase on current traffic.

The Committee Chair noted this would overwhelm crash response capacity. Witnesses highlighted that the Golden Highway has no turning lanes, no overtaking lanes, poor pavement, and inadequate rest areas, making it unsuitable to absorb such growth.

The Scoping Report fails to consider cumulative transport demand from concurrent projects. For example, more than 3,000 turbine parts are already moving from the Port of Newcastle to Squadron Energy projects, with additional heavy traffic expected along Merotherie Road, Elong and other renewable corridors.

Further, within 100 km of the Boree site there are at least 41 other major renewable projects (solar, wind, hydro and BESS) at various stages of approval, construction or operation. Even if each contributes an average of 150–200 vehicle movements per day, the cumulative impact across dozens of projects becomes extreme. By ignoring this full regional pipeline, the Scoping Report grossly underestimates traffic volumes and associated safety risks. A cluster of 10–12 projects lies within ~25 km of the site, including:

- Geurie Solar Farm (Approved, 6.6 km)
- Maryvale Solar Farm (Approved, 10.7 km)
- Wellington North Solar Farm (Under Construction, 13.5 km)

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- Dubbo Solar Hub (Operational, 13.7 km)
- South Keswick Solar Farm (Operating, 15 km)
- Wellington Solar Farm (Operational, 15.8 km)
- Bodangora Wind Farm (Operational, 18.4 km)
- Wellington Town BESS (In Planning, 22.5 km)
- Suntop Solar Farm (Operational, 22.5 km)
- Spicers Creek Wind Farm (In Planning, 23.6 km)

These projects concentrate heavy construction schedules, major deliveries and commuting workforces onto the Mitchell Highway, Golden Highway and connecting rural roads, creating intense local congestion. The claim of "low to medium" traffic is grossly inaccurate.

There is inadequate baseline data on traffic movements for the A32 (Mitchell Highway): the report relies on counts from locations not proximate to the project and lacks up-to-date, site-specific surveys, so comprehensive counts, turning-movement surveys, and peak-period modelling are required for the A32 and all surrounding access and haulage routes.

#### Hazards and Risks (Pages 89-90)

- Bushfire and electrical hazards appear duplicated, suggesting poor editing.
- Cumulative impacts are described only in vague terms; for a project of this size, measurable local and regional cumulative
  analysis is required but absent.

#### **Engagement (Section 5)**

- The claim that Venn Energy is "committed to ensuring local community and other stakeholder concerns are considered" is not supported by the evidence. Refer to our separate full report on Engagement.
- Material concerns are deferred or omitted: no mapped buffer/separation framework (including riparian corridors);
  inadequate and non-proximate traffic data for the A32 and local approaches while "minor upgrades" are asserted on
  narrow, timbered wildlife-corridor roads; a biased and under-powered survey that failed to segment directly impacted
  landholders; limited engagement (including exclusion of nearby villages and refusal to meet a landholder's nominated
  representative); and key risks (bushfire, dust, BESS safety, decommissioning/soil rehabilitation) addressed only at a high
  level with no measurable or enforceable commitments.
- Further key objection themes
  - Misrepresentation of engagement: directly affected communities (Geurie and Wongarbon; total population around 1,600) were excluded; formal objections were mischaracterised as "concerns"; reliance on biased industry
  - The Ethos Urban Preliminary Social Impact Assessment Section 4.1.1 Letter Mailout to Surrounding Residents claims that the 488 letters sent within a 5 km buffer provided information on "opportunities for community consultation including project briefings" is misleading. Residents between 2 km and 5 km were not offered project briefing sessions only a generic letter and survey. This social impact assessment fails to make this distinction, creating a false impression that all residents within the 5 km zone had equal access to consultation. This omission downplays the exclusion of highly impacted residents and demonstrates inadequate, selective engagement that does not meet NSW Government standards for transparency and fairness.
  - Failure to meet government standards: engagement activities inadequate for a high-impact SSD; no clear evidence that community feedback shaped project design.

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- Poor communication materials: the project-introduction letter resembled junk mail; maps were unclear; renters and adjoining residents were excluded from notification.
- Deficient community survey and briefings: the survey exhibited framing bias and was poorly promoted; landholder briefings were dismissive and evasive; the community was left without meaningful answers.
- Inadequate channels: the project email and enquiry line were ineffective; the website was non-functional or misleading; over-reliance on digital tools excluded rural and older residents.
- Withholding of critical information: significant changes (battery expansion, 132 kV substation) were not disclosed;
   an arbitrary cut-off date for feedback into the scoping report was not communicated.
- Unprofessional behaviour: reports of rude and insulting conduct by the engagement manager; commitments to landholders not honoured.
- Ongoing regulatory oversight: an active case with the Australian Energy Infrastructure Commissioner was ignored
  in the Scoping Report and misrepresented as routine liaison.
- Section 5.1.3 of the Scoping Report (p.31) proposes ten forms of engagement that will be used to inform the EIS
   (which will include the SIA). Further detail is provided in Table 5.5 (pp.56-58). A review of the list shows that the
   proposed techniques fall short of offering the appropriate range of participation types, in accordance with the SIA
   guideline Appendix A. Specifically
  - a. Six of the ten techniques are 'informing' i.e. the least participatory form of engagement newsletters, website updates, correspondence, factsheets, information sessions, and webinars.
  - b. One is not engagement at all (Project enquiry phone line and email).
  - c. One is consultation with public authorities (i.e. not community engagement).
  - d. Two are potentially more participatory (meetings and briefings) however these have been less than adequate as per separate report on engagement and active case with AEIC.
- o We refute any suggestion that meaningful engagement, consultation or communication has taken place in relation to this project. Genuine consultation is a two-way process that must be early, inclusive, transparent, and responsive, with feedback from affected residents clearly influencing project design and outcomes. What has occurred instead is tokenistic notification, Venn Energy telling us about the project (and that is going ahead whether we like it or not) briefings limited to select landholders, exclusion of nearby villages, vague letters, and no genuine opportunity for residents to shape the proposal. This cannot be described as engagement, consultation or communication under any NSW Government standard.
- The project site is now almost completely covered with infrastructure, often across areas that are impracticable such as waterways / deep erosion gullies, demonstrating that any feedback provided by affected neighbours has been ignored and overlooked.
- o Please refer to the additional objection letter specific to the engagement practices of Venn Energy and less than adequate allowance for social impact assessment

#### Incomplete and Misleading Site Suitability Assessment (Page 27)

The Scoping Report claims that "the site suitability assessment identified the Project Site location. As such a Development Footprint has been developed which is informed by the results of the desktop assessments and biodiversity ground truthing surveys. The Development Footprint will continue to evolve through the EIS process." (Page 27)

The project layout map ("Figure 1-2", Page 5) shows the majority of the site covered in solar panels, BESS and supporting
infrastructure, with little evidence of genuine avoidance of constraints.

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- The site maps fail to identify or overlay gullies, existing dams, hill systems, slopes and drainage lines, which are essential for
  assessing flood risk, erosion, bushfire behaviour and biodiversity corridors.
- This omission breaches the NSW SSD Scoping Report Guidelines (2022), Section 2.5 Maps and Figures, which require
  maps to show topography, hydrology (including watercourses, dams, drainage lines and flood-prone land), vegetation, land
  use and other environmental constraints relevant to the site.
- The avoid—minimise—mitigate hierarchy is not applied at scoping; impacts are deferred to the EIS. This defeats the purpose
  of scoping and undermines transparency.

#### Unacceptable Water-Related Impacts (Section 6.2.9.2)

The Report itself admits potential impacts to surface water, groundwater, flooding and aquatic ecology, especially during construction, including risks of sediment/erosion, dust deposition, spills and contamination, groundwater infiltration, aquifer intersection, drawdown/reduced streamflow, and altered overland flow from access tracks traversing creeks and riparian corridors.

#### However:

- There is no baseline hydrology mapping (gullies, dams, slopes, drainage lines), no groundwater baseline and no modelling, preventing a meaningful assessment of risk to aquifers, licensed users, downstream communities, fauna and riparian vegetation.
- The connectivity of riparian corridors and the ability of aquatic species to move upstream and downstream is acknowledged as at risk but not assessed.
- Without early avoidance commitments, key receptors (aquifers, streams, licensed water users, aquatic fauna, riparian vegetation, downstream users, the community) remain exposed.

#### EIS Assessment Approach (Page 104):

It is not universally true that solar farms exert "low to negligible" flood impacts. Effects are context-sensitive, depending on ground cover (vegetated vs gravel/bare), soil permeability, topography/slope, presence of natural drainage and flood flows, and stormwater measures. Poorly designed or managed arrays can increase runoff, erosion and localised flood risk. Any claim of negligible impact is conditional, not universal. The proposed project area is not considered flat. It has areas associated with slopes and erosion due to the topography and soil types. Removal of contour banks to install solar panels will significantly increase erosion impacts.

#### Air Quality and Dust Risks (Section 6.2.11)

- The Scoping Report proposes only a qualitative air quality assessment and asserts operational impacts will be minimal (maintenance vehicles, occasional deliveries).
- Elsewhere it contemplates onsite batching plants and a rock crusher both major dust sources.
- There is no mention of respirable crystalline silica (RCS), a Group 1 carcinogen typically generated by batching/crushing activities.
- No quantitative air modelling is proposed to test compliance with exposure standards, including for RCS (0.05 mg/m<sup>3</sup> TWA).
- No typical dust controls are listed (e.g., water sprays/mist cannons, enclosed conveyors, sealed hoppers, wheel-wash facilities, vegetative buffers, continuous monitoring, exclusion zones).

#### This approach is inconsistent with:

- Work Health and Safety Regulation 2017 (NSW), clause 49 (duty to manage airborne contaminants and ensure exposure standards are not exceeded); and
- SafeWork NSW Code of Practice: Managing the Risk of Respirable Crystalline Silica at Work (2020) (identifies batching/crushing as high-risk tasks requiring strict controls).

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Until quantitative assessment and clear dust control measures are specified, the project cannot demonstrate that it will safeguard the health and safety of workers, neighbours and the wider community.

#### ADDITIONAL MATTERS

Social Impact

The following information on social impact was prepared by Dr Richard Parsons, CEnvP (SIA). Social Research Services.

Dr Parsons has been engaged by The Save Geurie – Stop Boree Solar Project

- Overall: The main part of the Report presents social impacts, and how the Preliminary Social Impact Assessment (PSIA) presents these impacts. Broadly speaking, the PSIA is more upfront about the level of community opposition and the scale of impacts, whereas the main report downplays or glosses over these. The Scoping Report (p.21) notes there are six host landholders and an unspecified number of neighbouring landholders. In SIA terms, both groups would be considered 'directly affected', since they can expect to experience impacts directly as a result of the project, during both construction and operation. It is critical, therefore, that SIA analysis and engagement focus primarily on these residents.
  - It is reasonable to expect that SIA engagement for these groups (host and neighbouring landholders) should comprise
    a range of different techniques to ensure their participation in the SIA process, to suit different needs and levels of
    interest
  - 2. SIA engagement techniques should range from:
    - a. providing information that people need to understand the project,
    - b. to seeking their feedback on project-related matters,
    - c. to deliberative forums where they can directly influence project design and decision-making.
  - 3. An underlying principle in SIA is that directly-affected people should have collective agency over decisions that affect their lives. This does not mean that individuals have a veto, but a fair process is one where the community has a reasonable level of collective self-determination.
  - 4. The purpose of engaging with these groups is not only as a matter of courtesy, or a matter of meeting requirements under the Undertaking Engagement Guidelines (2024), but also to inform:
    - a. identification and characterisation of social impacts,
    - b. evaluation of their significance for affected people, and
    - c. design of mitigation and enhancement measures.
  - In addition, there should be broad engagement with the local community (not just Dubbo Regional Council) to inform any benefit-sharing scheme.
  - 6. Section 5.1.3 of the Scoping Report (p.31) proposes ten forms of engagement that will be used to inform the EIS (which will include the SIA). Further detail is provided in Table 5.5 (pp.56-58). A review of the list shows that the proposed techniques fall short of offering the appropriate range of participation types, in accordance with the SIA guideline Appendix A. Specifically:
    - a. Six of the ten techniques are 'informing' i.e. the least participatory form of engagement newsletters, website updates, correspondence, factsheets, information sessions, and webinars.
    - b. One is not engagement at all (Project enquiry phone line and email).
    - c. One is consultation with public authorities (i.e. not community engagement).
    - d. Two are potentially more participatory, depending on how they are designed and conducted (meetings and briefings).
  - 7. Section 5.3 suggests that the boundary for designating local residents and businesses as 'stakeholders' is 5km from the project boundary (p.32). This is reiterated in Section 6.2.10.1 (p.105). This is too restrictive, since it is reasonable to expect that people outside this boundary will have an interest in the project, and therefore should be included in SIA engagement. It is noted that those beyond this 5km boundary may be considered as within a 'secondary social

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locality', but a more precautionary and inclusive approach is warranted. A 5km boundary is arbitrary, and instead the identification and classification of stakeholders should be made on a contextual basis, proportionate to the likely degree of impact (including perceived impacts).

- 8. Table 5.4 (pp.48-53) summarises some community views and issues, noting where these will be addressed in the EIS. According to this table, the only issues that will be addressed in the SIA are:
  - a. property values
  - b. construction
  - c. insurance

This position overlooks the social dimensions (or indirect social impacts) that may be primarily biophysical, technical or procedural but which have social flow-on effects. Additionally, some issues clearly are principally social in nature, and must be assessed in the SIA, not just the overarching EIS document (e.g. Community cohesion and wellbeing).

The Scoping Report (p.106) notes the importance of assessing cumulative social impacts. This is appropriate, as long as it includes assessment from the perspectives of local affected people and communities.

- 9. Section 3.0 Social locality and baseline confirms the 5km boundary for the 'primary social locality', and the PSIA suggests that the SIA process will consider a broader range of impacts than suggested in the Scoping Report. It is not clear whether this boundary actually reflects the locations where impacts will be experienced. For example, topography may mean that some residents beyond this boundary experience visual and noise impacts, with flow-on social consequences.
- 10. Additionally, this primary social locality overlooks potential locations of social impacts that may be experienced during construction. For example, those living near haulage routes should be included in the primary social locality, and impacts on them given commensurate weighting.
- 11. Nevertheless, the inclusion of certain themes in Table 3 (pp.12-13), which conveys the gravity of community sentiment more clearly than in the main Scoping Report, points to a clear need for the SIA to:
  - a. be conducted impartially, preferably by an independent SIA practitioner who has no vested interest in the assessment outcome;
  - b. assess intangible impacts on First Nations culture, not just cultural heritage artefacts;
  - c. assess impacts on 'decision-making systems', with particular focus on community experiences with project information and engagement practices;
  - d. assess impacts on community character and people's sense of place;
  - e. assess impacts on people's livelihoods, especially for those working in agricultural operations;
  - $f.\ assess\ impacts\ on\ people's\ health\ and\ well being\ deriving\ from\ project-induced\ uncertainty.$
- 12. Table 4 (pp.18-23) proposes the level of assessment required for each scoped social impact. However, for some impacts, there is some discrepancy between the apparent magnitude of likely impacts and the proposed level of assessment. The following impacts appear to warrant a 'detailed' assessment, rather than 'standard':
  - a. Labour force challenges
  - b. Impacts to agricultural land use
  - c. Lack of trust and transparency
  - d. Workforce accommodation
  - e. Demand on social infrastructure and services

The practical effects of elevating these impacts to a detailed assessment would be a requirement for engagement to be broad rather than targeted, and for targeted primary research to be included in the SIA methodology (as per SIA Guideline Technical Supplement, p.13).

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#### Inadequate Fire Risk Assessment - BESS, Inverter, and Substation Hazards

The Scoping Report only acknowledges bushfire risks in general terms and overlooks major hazards specific to large-scale solar and Battery Energy Storage Systems (BESS). These include thermal runaway in lithium-ion batteries, arc flash, and the release of flammable and toxic gases during battery fires.

Toxic and flammable gases released during thermal runaway include:

- Hydrogen
- Methane
- Ethane and other hydrocarbons
- Carbon monoxide
- Carbon dioxide
- Hydrogen fluoride
- Hydrogen chloride
- Hydrogen cyanide
- Sulphur dioxide
- Nitrogen oxides

These gases pose severe risks to human health, emergency responders, and nearby communities.

The report also fails to consider the potential for inverter and substation fires, despite recent incidents including the Victorian Big Battery fire (2021), the Moss Landing BESS fire (2025), and the Hayes substation fire in London (2025). These events demonstrate the difficulty of extinguishing such fires, their potential to reignite, and the cascading impacts on communities and electricity networks.

The Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) must therefore include a detailed Fire and Explosion Risk Study, toxic gas dispersion modelling, and a robust Emergency Response Plan that covers suppression, evacuation, and first responder safety. Without this, the project's fire risks are dangerously underestimated.

#### • Fire Safety, Vegetation Corridors, and Fencing

- The site is Bushfire Prone Land (Category 3 medium risk) with grassland and semi-arid woodland. The report acknowledges a Bushfire Risk Assessment will be prepared, but there is no commitment to a minimum 50 m firebreak around the entire perimeter.
- Given slope, dry grass fuels and adjacent forestry, a 50 m perimeter firebreak is essential to protect neighbouring landholders, allow emergency vehicle access and reduce catastrophic fire spread.
- Asset Protection Zone width requirements (NSW RFS PBP 2019): examples include 20 m for grassland on flat ground;
   40–50 m for woodland on 5–10° upslope; and 50–65 m for forest on >10° upslope. These standards show a 50 m firebreak is not arbitrary but consistent with RFS expectations for sloping, bushfire-prone sites.
- Elevated landholder risk: Mr Peter Reardon of Beldara is located on a hill adjoining the project. Fire runs upslope with
  increased intensity and speed; a 10° upslope can double the rate of spread; 20° can quadruple it. Infrastructure and
  batteries below or adjacent to this hill increase entrapment risk for his residence and farmland without wide, wellmaintained firebreaks, safe access/egress routes and open escape corridors. (Note: Beldara (Reardon) has three sides
  adjoining the facility so is entrapped).

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- Historic laneways and old growth vegetation are ignored especially on the western boundary between Beldara
  (Reardon) and the project area. These should be retained and extended from the gazetted boundary to include (1)
  vegetation screening corridors, (2) access to maintain the rural fencing on the outside boundary, and (3) allowance for
  adequate firebreak corridors providing defensible space and access for fire control especially around the margins of
  heavily timbered areas on neighbours properties. High security fences are then placed further from the neighbours
  boundaries (ie) the inner boundary within the project area when these corridors are put in place. This will provide
  more adequate "immediate border" buffer zones.
- Perimeter high-security fencing is not limited to electrical installations (substations, BESS, O&M compounds). Full-boundary fencing would fragment wildlife habitat, block laneways, and create entrapment risks for both wildlife and people during fire events. The report does not provide for open wildlife corridors or fire escape routes. Therefore it is important to limit security fencing to actual electrical infrastructure (substation, BESS, inverters, switchyard) and do not perimeter-fence the entire site. Retain and map continuous, adequately wide wildlife corridors so fauna can traverse the area—especially between old-growth/timbered hills and established biodiversity corridors such as vegetated laneways. Any fencing outside electrical compounds must be fauna-permeable and must not obstruct these corridors.
- The size and shape of the project area, and stated locations of high security fencing will significantly change the flow of
  wildlife around the facility. This flow of wildlife, particularly kangaroos, will increase interactions between trains on the
  main rail line, and vehicles on the Mitchell Highway as the kangaroos attempt to get around the facility. Refer to the
  Appendix for diagrams and more information. The subsequent studies on wildlife needs to consider detailed
  assessment and data collection of the following:
  - migration routes of types and quantities of kangaroos and other species (eg) between Burrendong Dam and the Macquarie Marshes;
  - the impact of high security fencing driving kangaroos towards and over the main rail line and the Mitchell
     Highway as they attempt to get around the facility. There are two key exposure points (refer to the Appendix)
     on the highway where there will be significantly increased potential for fatal accidents.
  - The studies need to consider change to the design to allow for wildlife corridors through the project area.
     The location and width of the wildlife corridors should consider and address other impacts such as (but not necessarily limited to):
    - Emergency egress / escape for neighbours entrapped by the facility on three sides (aka Beldara / Reardon)
    - Access for bushfire prevention and control
    - Limit solar panels and infrastructure on very high impact visual amenity zones on sensitive receptors
       (ie) the corridors are placed in sight of nearby neighbour homes to address visual amenity issues
    - Limit solar panels and infrastructure on SSAL (ie) the corridors can be placed where there is SSAL
    - Place corridors along waterways and areas of potential significant erosion

#### • Water Resources and Hydrology

- The development footprint overlaps with surface water management structures (dams, gullies, contour banks).
- Subterranean watercourses and natural springs are not identified or assessed.
- Potential alteration of stream flows, groundwater recharge, and flood pathways (Boree Creek, Geurie Creek, Plain Creek, Long Gully, and Mitchell Creek) has not been adequately considered.
- A detailed hydrology study over a minimum 12-month cycle is required before EIS submission.

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## APPENDIX NO: 3 - STOP THE BOREE SOLAR FARM COMMUNITY GROUP SUBMISSION

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### Dust Impacts

Construction and haulage on unsealed roads, earthworks, and foundation works are likely to generate dust that can
settle on pastures and crops, reducing palatability and yield and posing respiratory/eye health risks to livestock; reduce
visibility and create safety hazards for local traffic, including school bus routes; impair visibility for low-flying aircraft
(e.g., RFS aerial firefighting or agricultural operators that routinely pass over the project area); and mobilise as
sediment into nearby waterways, increasing turbidity and degrading aquatic habitat and downstream water quality.
Unsuppressed dust therefore presents material risks to agricultural productivity, road and aviation safety, and
environmental values.

### • Negative Effects on Local Residents

- · Properties surrounded on multiple sides by solar panels and fencing will face substantial loss of amenity and wellbeing.
- Wildlife movement will be blocked by security fencing, yet the barrier effect is not addressed.
- Property value impacts (including for Self-Managed Superannuation Funds) are acknowledged in passing but no
  valuation study or mitigation is proposed (note: Beldara and the planned eco-retreat is part of Peter Reardon SMSF.
   Venn Energy were notified of this but it has not been considered adequately)
- Eco-tourism and local business reliant on rural amenity, wildlife and tranquillity are not considered.
- Construction noise risks are conceded but deferred to the EIS, despite an anticipated 24-month construction period.
- Not all sensitive receptors have been included on Beldara eco-retreat

## • Planning – Restriction of Growth of Geurie and Adverse Impact on "Sense of Place"

- The scoping report identifies a 5km "buffer zone" around the project area (see above regarding buffer zones in general) but does not adequately detail a plan to address the siting so close to the towns of Geurie and Wongarbon.
- The size and shape of the proposed project area wraps around the top of the environs within 5km of Geurie potentially restricting growth of the town. The Dubbo Regional Council only recently announced its report "Draft\_Dubbo\_Regional\_Housing\_Strategy" which is open for comment. The Desired Future Character in the report states "Geurie's village will continue to be a valued location for rural lifestyle living close to the jobs and amenity of Dubbo City. The village atmosphere and scale will be maintained, with infill development occurring on constraint-free land in line with Geurie's rural character".
- The Boree Solar project contradicts the DRC strategy. The Boree Project will:
  - $\circ\quad$  Adversely impact the "sense of place" of Geurie and residents; and
  - Restrict growth and reduce "sense of place" as the township attempts to expand over the next 25+ years.
     Due to constraints of flooding, the river to the south and other infrastructure, the targeted growth area in the DRC report for Geurie is to the north towards the proposed Boree Solar Facility.
- Please refer to the Appendix for more information on our recommendation regarding town planning and the restrictive
  impacts on Geurie by the proposed project. Geurie is a rapidly growing centre supporting the major regional city of
  Dubbo so needs room to grow whilst not degrading the sense of place by a major industrial facility on the outskirts of
  the town
- This should be considered in further studies and input from key stakeholders such as the Dubbo Regional Council.

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## Consideration of Emerging Findings or Potential Changes to Legislation or Policy

(1) State Significant Agricultural Land (SSAL)

- The report identifies current legal requirements and guidelines, however, does not consider short to medium term changes in planning policy that may impact the project. The key example is for the protection of State Significant Agricultural Land (SSAL). The scoping report does refer to the guideline for further consideration of SSAL which is identified across the project area. However, the Agricultural Minister recommended in July 2021 that "The NSW Government should take a phased approach to adopting a statutory State Significant Agricultural Land Use Planning Policy (SSALUP Policy)". This recommendation was endorsed by the NSW Government in March 2023. The SSAL maps have since been updated through an exhaustive consultation process. There is now limited impediment for the NSW Government to formalise legal protection for SSAL similar to what is in place for mining.
- o Please refer to the Appendix for more information on our recommendation regarding legal protection of SSAL.
- o This should be considered in further studies.

(2) Consideration of the findings from the Parliamentary Inquiry into the impact of Renewable Energy Zones (REZ) on rural and regional communities and industries in NSW (Portfolio Committee No.4)

The EIS should consider emerging information regarding the impact of renewable projects on rural communities.
 A detailed assessment should be conducted to analyse how the project addresses the issues identified and recommendations from this Inquiry.

### Buffer Zones

- There remains ambiguity around the definition and location of buffer zones for this Project. The Scoping Report
  does not provide a clear map identifying where buffers will be situated, nor does it explain how they will be
  established or maintained. Without this information, it is difficult for the community to understand whether
  buffers are being applied consistently across the site or how they will function in practice.
- o The only map provided to the community as part of site visit literature appears to show buffer areas located on neighbouring landholders' properties rather than within the Project boundary. This has created concern and uncertainty, as it gives the impression that private land may be relied upon for landscaping or vegetative screening. Notably, the preliminary scoping consultation identified a clear request from directly affected landholders for more information about project details including traffic access routes and movements, location of panels and other infrastructure, offsets and buffers, decommissioning and remediation, and future community engagement. This reinforces the need for further clarification to ensure buffers are properly defined within the Project site and that landholders are not left carrying unintended obligations.

## • Errors, Typos and Incorrect Agency References

- AEIC misnamed: listed as "Australian Energy Independent Commission" instead of Australian Energy Infrastructure Commissioner
- "predominate land use" (Page 13) should be "predominant."
- "lasted checked 18 June 2025" (Page 16) should be "last checked."
- "Australis energy network" (Table 2-1, Page 11) should be "Australia's energy network."
- Hazards section duplication: bushfire and electrical hazards repeated almost verbatim in Section 6.2.5.
- Terminology inconsistency: Section 3.1.1.4 states no new transmission infrastructure required, yet elsewhere new underground/overhead lines and a 132 kV substation are listed.

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### Recommendations for EIS Stage - Boree Solar Project (SSD-90792956)

### 1. Mapping, Site Data, and Suitability

- Update and expand mapping using current (post-2017) datasets, including dams, bores, contour banks, gullies, slopes, and residential/farm infrastructure.
- Correct errors in social locality mapping (e.g., Geurie and Wongarbon incorrectly placed).
- Apply the avoid-minimise-mitigate hierarchy at EIS stage with measurable mapped buffers (riparian corridors, dwellings, roads, biodiversity corridors) rather than deferring to later stages.

## 2. Flooding, Hydrology, and Water Resources

- Undertake a 12-month hydrology study to establish baseline surface and groundwater conditions.
- Model altered overland flows from solar arrays, haul roads, and removal of contour banks.
- Assess impacts on Boree Creek, Geurie Creek, Plain Creek, Long Gully, and Mitchell Creek, including downstream floodprone areas especially the township of Geurie with a high Population At Risk (PAR).
- Assess connectivity of riparian corridors and aquatic species movement.

### 3. Fire, BESS, Inverter, and Substation Hazards

- Undertake a full Fire and Explosion Risk Study addressing:
  - Thermal runaway in lithium batteries.
  - Arc flash risks.
  - Inverter and substation fire risks (drawing on incidents such as Moss Landing, Victorian Big Battery, Hayes Substation).
- Model toxic and flammable gas emissions from battery failure, including: hydrogen, methane, ethane, carbon
  monoxide, carbon dioxide, hydrogen fluoride, hydrogen chloride, hydrogen cyanide, sulphur dioxide, and nitrogen
  oxides.
- Require a robust Emergency Response Plan including automatic fire detection and suppression systems on electrical
  equipment and batteries (given the site is not supervised once in operation and fires could start at any time of day and
  night), on-site equipment and firefighting resources including adequately sized water tanks, evacuation procedures,
  and first responder training.
- Commit to firebreaks consistent with NSW RFS Planning for Bushfire Protection (2019), e.g. 50 m perimeter firebreaks
  on bushfire-prone sloping sites. Placement of these fire breaks are placed inside of other buffer corridors such as
  historical laneways, access for the maintenance of rural boundary fences, existing vegetation on the boundary, surface
  water management structures such as contour banks near boundaries and additional screening for visual amenity.

## 4. Decommissioning and Rehabilitation

- Align decommissioning commitments in the statutory EIS with the public website's promises:
  - $\circ \quad \text{Independent third-party costed decommissioning fund accessible to landholders}.$
  - o Binding recycling obligations.
  - $\circ \quad \text{Full removal of underground infrastructure, footings, and piles to restore agricultural capability.}\\$
- Provide enforceable, independently overseen Rehabilitation and Decommissioning Management Plan.
- Clarify responsibilities for waste removal, soil remediation, and long-term land capability restoration.

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### 5. Traffic and Cumulative Transport

- Conduct up-to-date site-specific traffic counts and turning-movement surveys on the Mitchell Highway, Golden Highway, and local approach roads.
- Assess haulage conflicts with school buses, cyclists, and local traffic.
- Quantify and address cumulative traffic impacts from at least 40+ renewable projects in the Central-West Orana REZ.
- Identify safety upgrades (turning lanes, overtaking lanes, pavement strengthening) to mitigate crash and congestion

## 6. Dust, Air Quality, and Worker/Community Health

- Undertake quantitative dust and air quality modelling including respirable crystalline silica (RCS) from batching, crushing, and construction activities.
- Identify and commit to best-practice dust controls: water cannons, sealed conveyors, wheel-wash facilities, vegetative buffers, and continuous monitoring.
- Demonstrate compliance with WHS Regulation 2017 and SafeWork NSW RCS Code of Practice (2020).

## 7. Social Impact Assessment (SIA)

- Expand SIA engagement beyond the arbitrary 5 km boundary, including haulage route communities and sensitive
  receptors.
- Commission an independent SIA practitioner with no vested interest.
- Elevate key issues to "detailed" assessment level, including:
  - o Agricultural land use impacts
  - o Labour force challenges
  - o Workforce accommodation pressures
  - Demand on local infrastructure/services
  - Community trust and transparency
- Assess social impacts such as community cohesion, wellbeing, livelihoods, mental health, decision-making systems, and cultural values (First Nations).

## 8. Wildlife Corridors, Vegetation, and Fencing

- Prohibit full perimeter high-security fencing
- Restrict high security fencing to electrical compounds
- Design and map wide, permeable wildlife corridors across the project site (200 m recommended).
- Model impacts of fencing on kangaroo migration and road/train collisions (Mitchell Highway, main rail line).
- Retain historic laneways and vegetation corridors for biodiversity and bushfire management.

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### 9. Impacts on Local Communities and Town Planning

- Assess restrictions on the growth of Geurie and Wongarbon, consistent with Dubbo Regional Council's Housing Strategy.
- Consider the "sense of place" impacts on small villages within 5 km of the site.
- Require statutory protections: 10 km buffer zones around Geurie and Wongarbon; expansion of Dubbo's REZ exclusion zone from 10 km to 15 km.

## 10. Protection of State Significant Agricultural Land (SSAL)

- Apply mandatory protection mechanisms for SSAL consistent with protections already in place for mining/petroleum under SEPP (Resources and Energy) 2021.
- Update and integrate the latest SSAL maps into the EIS assessment.
- Prioritise siting of renewable projects outside mapped SSAL areas.

### 11. Engagement and Consultation<sup>2</sup>

- Require genuine, two-way engagement processes: open community meetings, clear maps, transparent consultation with both landholders and renters.
- Address procedural fairness failures identified by AEIC and NSW REZ Inquiry.
- Ensure survey design and reporting meet NSW Social Impact Assessment Guideline standards.

## **Final Conclusion**

The Boree Solar Project Scoping Report is inadequate. Despite assurances at the project briefing session that additional information would be provided, the report does not deliver that detail or clarity and has left highly impacted adjacent landholders with more questions than answers.

I respectfully request that the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure reject this Scoping Report in its current form and require Venn Energy to resubmit a comprehensive, transparent, community-informed document that provides the promised information and meets NSW standards for State Significant Development assessment.

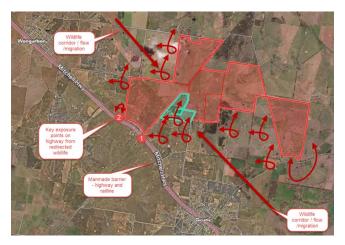

## 1. Wildlife Corridors - impact on landholders and increasing traffic accidents on Mitchell Highway

Potential Impacts of wildlife flows not considered – high fencing not allowing passage but also (1) redirecting kangaroos across the highway leading to more potentially fatal accident in sections of a major National highway A32 (Locations 1 to 2 below); (2) Increased flows of wildlife into urban areas (Geurie); and (3) entrapped on neighbours properties (eg) Beldara / Reardon (green farm depicted below)



Potential Mitigation – allowance for open corridors that also address other factors such as SSAL, visual amenity, access for bushfire prevention and management, emergency egress / escape from trapped landholders and surface water management (i.e.) place wide (200m) corridors across the project area to allow for wildlife flow through the project area but place the corridors to address high impact visual amenity areas (no solar panels) especially for highly impacted landholders with the project on three sides (Beldara/Reardon) where there is also SSAL, avoiding areas of high surface water runoff and slopes causing erosion etc. That is, have a holistic approach to risk mitigation that addresses multiple impacts with a carefully designed control (corridors).



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Design and implement mandatory (legal) protections of small rural communities by enhancing existing planning policy
to include a 10km buffer zone around gazetted rural towns and villages to exclude SSD Renewable Energy projects. The
renewable Zone (Exclusion) around Dubbo would also need to be increased from approx. 10km to 15km to allow for
future growth.

## Comments

This would require recognition of small towns similar to "regional cities" within the <u>State Environmental Planning Policy</u> (<u>Transport and Infrastructure</u>) 2021, <u>Section 2.42</u> <u>Determination of development applications for solar or wind electricity generating works on certain land</u> (includes a reference to the Regional Cities Map).

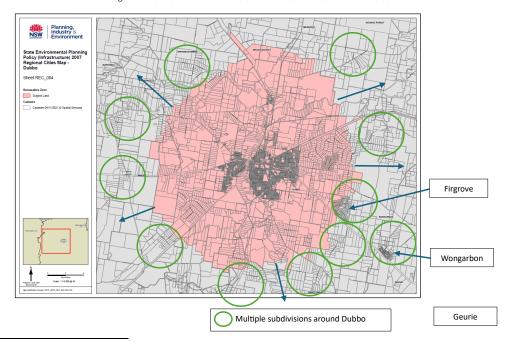


Figure 1 : NSW Government Exclusion Zone Around Dubbo $^4$  - Renewables

This statutory map includes Dubbo (Figure 1). This exclusion zone is currently approx. 10km. However, this is now inadequate for protecting future growth. Examples include new sub-divisions of Firgrove and the small lots as indicated on the map in Figure 1 outside the pink exclusion zone. Therefore the Dubbo exclusion zone would also need to be increased to at least 15km. Towns such as Wongarbon, Geurie and similar townships need to be now considered with the rapid expansion of the Dubbo Regional Area. Townships within 30km of large regional cities are akin to Parramatta or major outlying suburbs of Sydney. Small rural townships are suburbs of the city and require area for future growth. Imagine placing 3200 acres of solar panels around Parramatta 60 years ago restricting urban development? These renewable energy SSD projects are expected to be in operation for many decades so their future, restrictive impact on rural towns must be taken into consideration. Geurie and Wongarbon are growing and need the same protections as the existing, recognised Regional Cities – as Dubbo grows, so do they as a linked rural "suburbs" of the main centre.

This ensures the current planning policy<sup>3</sup> is enhanced and updated rather than requiring new policy.

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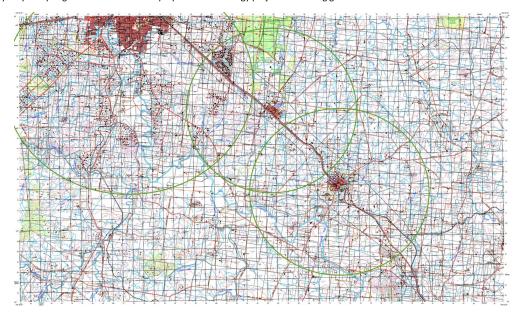

The following image demonstrates the intensity of, and potential for, population growth in and around Dubbo along the A32 corridor. Towns such as Wongarbon and Geurie within 30km of major regional cities such as Dubbo are akin to the Parramatta's of Sydney. Very large tracts of land taken up by renewable energy projects restricting growth for decades is not sustainable.



It should also be noted that south of Geurie is constrained by the proximity to the river, flooding, topography and existing infrastructure hence growth will be mainly to the north of town (where the Boree Project is situated within 5km).

Design and implement mandatory (legal) protections of agricultural land by enhancing existing planning policy to include mandatory protection mechanisms for State Significant Agricultural Land (SSAL) similar to existing protections from mining and petroleum development.

Comments

Following a review by the NSW Department of Primary Industries in 2021<sup>5</sup>, it has been recognised by the NSW Government there is a need for the phased approach for statutory implementation of a State Significant Agricultural Land Use Policy to strengthen planning for agriculture<sup>6</sup>. Table 1 provides a summary of these reports and a comment on status.

The Central-West Orana Renewable Energy Zone (CWO REZ) was formally declared on November 5, 2021, by the NSW Minister for Energy and Environment. The capacity was initially 3 gigawatts but subsequently increased to 7.7 gigawatts. The increases in capacity declared are expected to increase further.

The significant pace of the transition in conjunction with no statutory policy for the protection of agricultural land, especially SSAL, is of concern. Especially since the requirement for legal protection of SSAL was recognised and endorsed by the government over 4 years ago.

We acknowledge that the <u>Large Scale Solar Energy Guideline</u> details the key principles required for the assessment of projects, including consideration of agricultural land and BSAL. This guideline refers to the agricultural land maps available on <u>SEED</u> of Important Agricultural Land (IAL) and biophysical strategic agricultural land (BSAL) now called State Significant Agricultural Land (SSAL). This however is only a guideline.

There already exists mandatory protection mechanisms for State Significant Agricultural Land (SSAL) from mining and petroleum development within the <u>State Environmental Planning Policy (Resources and Energy) 2021, Part 2.4 Mining and petroleum development on strategic agricultural land (includes a reference to the Government Strategic Agricultural Land Map - SEED). Significant resources may also be found on the <u>NSW Planning - Safeguarding our agricultural land (Mining and resources) web site.</u> This information can be used as an input to the proposed legislative changes to protect agricultural land from other forms of development such as SSD renewable energy projects.</u>

This preliminary review demonstrates that:

- 1. the NSW Government has already endorsed the need for legal protection of SSAL;
- 2. Systems and processes are already in place for the legal protection of SSAL from mining and petroleum activities;
- 3. Supporting guidelines and tools such as maps are already available to support the legislative requirements;
- 4. There have been delays in progressing the endorsed recommendations since they were made over 4 years ago;
- 5. Many renewable energy projects are placed on prime agricultural land and SSAL causing considerable angst in the community: and
- There has been a rapid implementation of the renewable transition to meet targets often with ever increasing objections from rural communities and no social licence obtained by the renewable energy proponents.

There is *existing* planning policy that recognises the need to *protect* SSAL; there is the draft SSAL map which has been updated after an extensive consultation process; and the government has already *endorsed* the requirement for *statutory protection* of SSAL.

It is therefore recommended that the government:

- 1. Expedite the government endorsed development of legal protection for SSAL and agricultural land;
- 2. Review and update the existing guideline requirements to support the new legal protections; and
- 3. In principle, apply mandatory protections for SSAL concurrently with all existing and new SSD assessment.

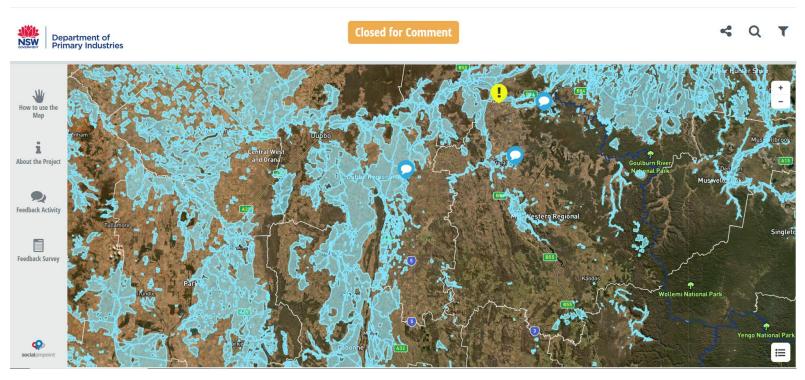
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Figure 3 : SSAL (Blue) Around Geurie from latest Draft SSAL Map completed in 2022

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Figure 4 : Dubbo Regional View of Draft SSAL Map

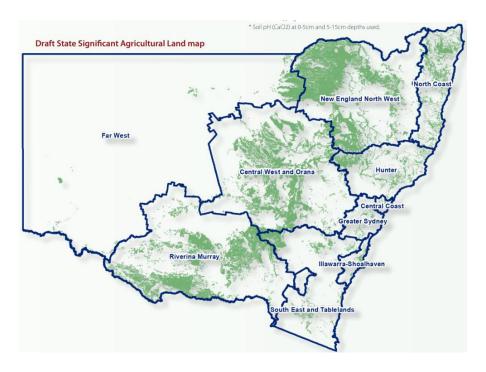

## 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report sets out the objections raised by the Save Geurie – Stop Boree Solar Project group and affected landholders regarding the Boree Solar Farm Scoping Report (SSD-90792956). It highlights serious deficiencies in Venn Energy's consultation and engagement practices, which fall well short of NSW Government requirements for State Significant Development (SSD) projects.

The objections demonstrate that the Scoping Report does not accurately reflect the extent or seriousness of community opposition, and that the engagement process has been misleading, selective, and procedurally unfair.

Key Objection Themes

- Misrepresentation of Engagement Excluded directly affected communities (both Geurie and Wongarbon – total population 1600); mischaracterised formal objections as "concerns"; reliance on biased industry material.
- Failure to Meet Government Standards Engagement activities inadequate for a high-impact SSD;
   failure to show how community feedback shaped project design.
- Poor Communication Materials Project introduction letter resembled junk mail; unclear maps; renters and adjoining residents excluded from notification.
- Deficient Community Survey and Briefings The community survey had a framing bias and was
  poorly promoted; landholder briefings dismissive and evasive; community left without meaningful
  answers.
- Inadequate Channels Project email and enquiry line ineffective; website non-functional and misleading; over-reliance on digital tools that excluded rural/older residents.
- Withholding of Critical Information Significant project changes (battery expansion, 132 kV substation) not disclosed; arbitrary cut-off date for submissions for feedback into scoping report not communicated.
- Unprofessional Behaviour Reports of rude and insulting conduct by the Engagement Manager; commitments to landholders not honoured.
- Ongoing Regulatory Oversight Active case with the Australian Energy Infrastructure Commissioner (AEIC) ignored in the Scoping Report and misrepresented as routine liaison.

The Boree Solar Farm Scoping Report (SSD-90792956) presents an unreliable and misleading account of community engagement. The process has failed to meet NSW Engagement Guidelines for State Significant Projects (2022), excluded key stakeholders, misrepresented objections, and demonstrated poor transparency and accountability.

On this basis, the Scoping Report cannot be accepted as an accurate reflection of consultation. The Department must require Venn Energy to correct the record, re-engage with the community transparently, and properly account for the breadth and seriousness of objections before this project proceeds any further.

## 2. PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to object to the narrative on Engagement Practices outlined by Eco Logical on behalf of Venn Energy in the Boree Solar Farm Scoping Report (SSD-90792956). This report will highlight the failings and deficiencies in the engagement practices undertaken by Venn Energy and Ethos Urban with highly impacted adjoining neighbours and other stakeholders. The report will also demonstrate that engagement has been inadequate against requirements for projects with high impact and high significance for the community.

Specifically, the objection seeks to:

- 1. correct omissions and inaccuracies in Venn Energy's description of engagement to date
- prevent premature reliance by Department of Planning, Industry and Environment (DPIE) on the current scoping narrative until the failings and deficiencies are documented accurately by Venn Energy.
- 3. Encourage the DPIE to take into consideration all objections listed before issuing the SEARS.

## 3. SCOPE

This objection report has been prepared in response to Section 5 – Engagement within the Boree Solar Farm Scoping Report<sup>1</sup>, and the associated Community and Stakeholder Engagement Plan<sup>2</sup>. The scope of this objection is limited to examining the adequacy, accuracy, and fairness of the community and stakeholder engagement processes described by the proponent, and whether these processes meet the expectations and requirements set out under the State Significant Development (SSD) framework.

### 4. CONTEXT

Venn Energy currently has an active case with the Australian Energy Infrastructure Commission (AEIC) for less than adequate inadequate practices<sup>3</sup>.

The AEIC is an independent body that investigates complaints about large-scale energy projects such as wind farms, solar farms, and transmission lines. It helps communities and landholders raise concerns, identifies systemic issues, and makes recommendations to government and industry to improve consultation and project practices.

In addition, the Conciliations / Investigations Officer - Energy Transition Energy & Water Ombudsman NSW wrote to Venn Energy about the concerns the Geurie community raised regarding engagement.

### 6 SUMMARY OF OBJECTIONS

The Save Geurie – Stop Boree Solar Project group object to the information on Engagement in the scoping report due to the following reasons outlined below (in no particular order). Each of these objections are explained in depth in part 6 of this report:

- Venn Energy has an active case with the AEIC for less than adequate communication and consultation practices, and this has not been acknowledged in the scoping report. Instead, the Scoping Report states the proposed engagement tools with the AEIC are "direct liaison, meetings and correspondence as required". This is misleading.
- 2. Engagement practices are inadequate against NSW Government requirements for SSD projects with high impacts and significance for the community.
- Inadequate or misleading consultation practices, including failure to engage meaningfully with directly affected residents and highly impacted adjoining landholders. This included excluding affected communities (such as Geurie and Wongarbon) from early engagement activities.
- 4. Long-term residents renting homes within 2 km of the project site were not included in the project briefings and did not receive any formal notification letter, despite being directly affected by the development.
- 5. Lack of meaningful engagement or slow / non-existent responses from the proponent, even after multiple contact attempts by highly impacted adjoining neighbours.
- 6. Poor quality or poorly presented communication materials, such as letters that resembled junk mail and failed to clearly identify the project's location and scale.
- 7. Community surveys that were poorly designed, biased, or failed to reach or reflect the views of the most affected residents.
- 8. The community survey (which informed the scoping report) was not adequately promoted and therefore could not be considered a genuine engagement activity. Promotion was limited and failed to ensure that all potentially affected residents and stakeholders were aware of the survey. For a project of this scale, surveys should have been widely advertised through local media, council channels, social media, noticeboards, and in-person sessions to ensure meaningful and inclusive participation.
- 9. Vague, evasive, or opaque answers to questions, whether in person, via email, or through published FAQs.
- 10. Community engagement team were unable to provide any information or explanation about the solar farm at initial project briefing session. Vague statements such as "still to be determined" and "will be in the scoping report" were standard responses to questions.
- 11. Misleading, selective, or unsupported claims on the project website (e.g. on property values, insurance and decommissioning)
- 12. Over-reliance on digital surveys or online-only channels that exclude many rural residents or older community members.
- 13. Failure to properly explain significant project changes, such as increases in larger battery storage and the inclusion of a 132KV collector substation.
- 14. Failure to demonstrate how community feedback has influenced project design or mitigation strategies.

- 15. Unclear or inaccessible complaints and feedback processes, with no visible escalation pathway or independent oversight.
- 16. Rude and insulting behaviour by the Venn Energy Community Stakeholder Engagement Manager to an affected landholder at the initial project briefing session<sup>5</sup>.
- 17. Nonfunctioning website, despite landholders being told at project briefing sessions in April that all information about the project can be found on the website.
- 18. Use of biased industry materials, such as promotional fact sheets from the Clean Energy Council, rather than independent evidence.
- 19. Failure to honor commitments to affected landholders (promised a face to face meeting, but did not provide one even though engagement team were in Dubbo / Geurie).
- 20. Critical information, including the arbitrary cut-off date of 9 May for community feedback (to be included in scoping report), was not proactively communicated.
- 21. Consultation and communication fatigue, where the community is repeatedly asking for information or feedback without any visible outcomes or accountability.
- 22. The Scoping Report deliberately downplays and misrepresents formal community objections by labelling them as mere "concerns," a tactic that diminishes their procedural weight, breaches the NSW Engagement Guidelines for State Significant Projects (2022), and fundamentally undermines the integrity and fairness of the assessment of SSD-90792956.

### 7. ENGAGEMENT PRACTICES<sup>6</sup>

## 7.1 OVERVIEW

**Statement 1:** Venn Energy is committed to ensuring local community and other stakeholder concerns and interests are considered throughout the development of the Project. Engagement has been and will continue to be undertaken with a range of stakeholders throughout the Project's development, including various government agencies, service providers, the local community, First Nations organisations and people, special interest groups, and neighbouring and adjacent landowners.

## Objection 1 – Misrepresentation of Engagement Practices

- 1. The statement provided by Venn Energy significantly overstates the quality and inclusiveness of engagement undertaken to date. Contrary to the proponent's claim of commitment to considering community and stakeholder concerns, affected residents of Geurie and Wongarbon were excluded from genuine consultation opportunities. Geurie and Wongarbon residents were not included in face-to-face project briefing sessions.<sup>7</sup>
- No open community meetings were convened, a large proportion of neighbouring and adjacent landholders were not engaged, and initial notification materials were presented in a manner that could easily be mistaken for unsolicited mail.<sup>8</sup>
- 3. Assurances given to landholders regarding priority engagement were not honoured.

- 4. It is also of particular concern that a key stakeholder, Mayor of Dubbo Regional Council, first became aware of the project through a community Facebook group (Save Geurie – Stop Boree Solar Project) rather than from the proponent directly?
- 5. The project description provided to residents in March 2025 differs materially from the current scoping report, with the Battery Energy Storage System expanded from 150 MW / 600 MWh to 200 MW / 800 MWh, and the addition of a new 132 kV collector substation. These changes increase potential impacts yet were not transparently communicated to the community, raising concerns about accuracy, transparency, and procedural fairness in the consultation process.
- 6. The engagement process described in the Scoping Report does not accurately reflect the experiences of the community and fails to demonstrate compliance with the Department of Planning and Environment's Community and Stakeholder Engagement Guidelines for State Significant Projects (2022), which emphasise transparency, inclusivity, early engagement and procedural fairness.

## 7.2 ENGAGEMENT OBJECTIVES

**Statement 2:** The engagement objectives for this Project are to: Consult proactively with the local community and stakeholders using clear, consistent and up-to date Project information; continue to engage with the local community and stakeholders to identify potential issues, opportunities and mitigation measures; communicate the progress of the Project; enable the local community and stakeholders to have input into the preparation of the EIS and future stages; and implement response and feedback strategies to address stakeholder questions and concerns, and where possible, use these to inform the development and refinement of the Project.

## Objection 2 – Failure to Meet Stated Engagement Objectives

 The engagement objectives outlined by Venn Energy are aspirational in nature but have not been demonstrated in practice. The proponent has not engaged, consulted or communicated proactively with the local community.

## 7.3 PHASE ONE – SCOPING PHASE ENGAGEMENT (ENGAGEMENT TO DATE)<sup>10</sup>

**Statement 3:** Phase One engagement has included the following elements: Project introduction letters - community within 5km of the Project site; Project introduction letters - stakeholders; Community survey; Adjacent landowner initial Project briefings; Government agency, Council and service provider initial Project briefings and consultation; Establishment of dedicated Project email and enquiry line; Publication of Project website - later in consultation process

## Objection 3 – Misrepresentation in Section 5.1.2 ("Phase One – Scoping Phase Engagement")

Section 5.1.2 ("Phase One – Scoping Phase engagement") is materially understated and does not accurately reflect what occurred within each listed element nor does it reflect the behaviour of the engagement team.

The description is confined to generic activity labels and omits essential particulars while overlooking material shortcomings observed in practice, including selective outreach, ineffective notification, inconsistent information, less than adequate community survey, poor quality website (public facing information) unfulfilled commitments to landholders, and inadequate responsiveness to enquiries and complaints.

As presented, the summary creates a misleading impression of early, inclusive, and proactive engagement and cannot be relied upon as an accurate record of engagement to date

### Objection 4 – Deficiencies in Project Introduction Letters to the Community within 5 km

## 1. Format, coverage and timing

- o Resembled unsolicited junk mail, with residents saying they discarded the letter.
- Generic "Dear resident" letter. Weak evidence of direct notification, poor auditability of who was reached and when.
- Two different versions mailed (one with a "Project briefing" section offering 8–9 April meetings and an RSVP by 2 April, one without that section). Inconsistent opportunities across households; undermines fairness and transparency
- 5 km mail-out radius only: Ignores likely impact corridors outside 5 km (e.g., haul routes, fire/evacuation, noise/visual catchments). SSD guidance expects methods proportionate to impact, not distance alone.
- o Letter was mailed in 27 March, around School Holidays, Easter and Anzac Day.

## 2. Unrealistic RSVP window for project briefings

- One letter dated 27 March but asks for availability to book a project briefing session by 2 April.
- Many directly impacted landholders received letter after the RSVP date due to postal delays as residents and landholders do not receive mail daily, Wongarbon does not have a mail service at all – with residents having to collect their mail. Some residents also have PO Boxes in Dubbo.

## 3. Accessibility and inclusivity

- Survey promoted primarily via QR code (phone option mentioned but passive). This
  excludes or deters residents with limited digital access/skills. No hard-copy survey
  enclosed, and no reply-paid return offered.
- Business-hours phone only, no after-hours/voice-mail service standards. This reduces accessibility for working residents.
- No translation/interpretation or accessibility offer (e.g., large print, Easy English). This
  does not meet inclusive practice expectations.
- No explicit privacy statement for survey data or complaints/enquiries. Residents not provided information on how their information was to be used or stored.

## 4. Content sufficiency and clarity

o Map is unclear for decision-use: low resolution, no 5 km buffer, no nearest receptors, no haul routes or sensitive sites (schools, RFS sheds, health facilities), and no scale bar

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## APPENDIX NO: 4 - STOP THE BOREE SOLAR FARM COMMUNITY GROUP OBJECTION TO SCOPING REPORT

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- adjacent to the red outline. It states "shown in red" but doesn't enable a resident to understand proximity or likely exposure pathways.
- Maps for SSD projects must follow NSW Planning's minimum standards: use a standard base map, include a north arrow and scale, provide a clear legend for boundaries/infrastructure, and state the source of mapping data.
- Capacity details are technical and potentially confusing (e.g., "250 MW DC/150 MW AC; BESS 150 MW/4-hour = 600 MWh) without plain-English explanation of AC vs DC or what 600 MWh means in practice (traffic, fire load, noise, hazard scenarios).
- No plain-English impact summary (traffic, noise, visual, glare, fire, biodiversity, flooding, workforce housing) or "how these will be assessed," which SSD guidance encourages at scoping-stage notifications.
- Website listed is the corporate site, not a dedicated project page with an update log, document library, or subscription function; "later in consultation process" is vague.

## 5. Process transparency and accountability

- No open public meetings offered (Geurie/Wongarbon) in the "no-briefing" version; in the "briefing" version, the offer is **one-to-one** by appointment only. This does not provide equitable, transparent Q&A for all residents.
- No Community Reference Group (CRG) or independent facilitation/audit commitment identified.
- No complaints process outlined (categories, response times, escalation paths) and no commitment to publish a de-identified issues register.
- No "you said, we did" mechanism. No pathway showing how input will influence layout, traffic management, noise controls, or workforce accommodation and other SSD issues.

## 6. Consistency and completeness

- Inconsistent collateral (briefing vs no-briefing versions). Different households received materially different engagement opportunities at the same stage.
- Short survey window (closing 28 April) with no disclosure of method, response-rate targets, demographic balancing, or how results will be published and used. This increases risks of biased "sentiment" reporting. Timing was around Easter, School Holidays and Anzac Day.
- No reference to First Nations-specific engagement pathway (separate from general mail-outs). The letter does not demonstrate culturally appropriate early engagement alongside technical heritage studies.

## Objection 5 – Deficiencies in Project Introduction to Stakeholders

- Table 5.1 Stakeholder identification and issues mapping outlines stakeholders and proposed engagement tools for scoping and EIS stages.
- A proportion of the engagement tools listed were project notification via email / letter. A simple notification email is inadequate for a project of this scale as it only provides one-way information, lacks genuine dialogue, and therefore cannot be considered a valid engagement method.

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- 3. Of particular concern is that Dubbo Regional Council, a primary stakeholder, first became aware of the project through the community Facebook group Save Geurie Stop Boree Solar Project despite Venn Energy stating otherwise.
- 4. It is stated that communities within a 5k radius of the project site, including members of the Geurie and Wongarbon Communities were offered initial project briefing (face to face, on line or via phone) 13. This is not true only residents within a 2-kilometre radius if the project were offered a project briefing session.
- Community groups and businesses within 5k radius have not been listed at all, but the scoping report states that they received an initial project notification letter, initial project briefing session (face to face, online or via phone), access to community hotline, project website and community survey.

### Objection 6 - Deficiencies in the Community Survey

- 1. A deficient and flawed community survey is a serious problem in the context of a State Significant Development (SSD) because it directly informs the Scoping Report, which in turn forms the basis of the Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARs). If the survey is biased, selectively distributed, or fails to capture the views of those most affected, the resulting data gives a misleading picture of community attitudes and priorities. This can lead to critical issues such as traffic, noise, fire risk, visual impact, or cumulative effects being understated or overlooked in the SEARs. Once embedded, these deficiencies flow through the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) process, constraining assessment, skewing mitigation measures, and ultimately undermining the integrity of decision-making. Inaccurate or incomplete community input at the scoping stage therefore compromises procedural fairness, weakens public trust, and risks approvals being granted without a proper understanding of the project's true impacts.
- 2. The survey's language was promotional and biased, implying the project was advancing ("as we move into the next stage of planning"), discouraging critical feedback.
- 3. Key questions used leading language (e.g., "enhancing sustainability") and offered restricted answer options (e.g., three-point scales).
- 4. Critical issues were omitted, including:
  - o Agricultural productivity loss
  - o Property devaluation
  - o Water contamination
  - o Fire and insurance risks (including BESS)
  - Mental health impacts
  - o Panel toxicity and decommissioning
  - o Emergency access restrictions

## Objection to Scoping Report for Boree Solar Farm SSD- 90792956: Engagement Practices

- o Compulsory land access
- o Cultural heritage concerns
- 5. Access to the survey was distributed via the project (junk mail) letter and could be accessed via QR code or community members had to proactively phone the Engagement Team to request a link to be emailed or complete the survey over the phone. The survey was not promoted by any other means (ie. Media, social media, website, etc.)
- 6. The Geurie community was forced to replicate the survey in hard copy and collected 39 handwritten responses highlighting the proponent's failure in inclusive engagement.

### Refusal to Re-Issue Survey

- 1. On 6 May 2025, Venn Energy formally refused to reissue the community survey.
- This refusal, despite multiple formal requests and clearly documented deficiencies in the original survey, is both dismissive and unjustified.
- Venn Energy provided no adequate rationale for declining to revise the survey, and this decision appears to disregard the obligation to engage in genuine, good faith consultation as required under New South Wales SSD policy.

## Objection 7 – Deficiencies in Adjacent Landowner Initial Project Briefings

- We strongly object to the quality of the initial project briefing sessions, which were time-boxed to 45 minutes and later capped at only one hour. This was an inadequate window for affected landholders to understand impacts, ask questions, or obtain answers.
- The definition of "adjacent" landowners was drawn too narrowly. Residents within 2–5 km of the site—approximately 1,600 people—were excluded (by Venn Energy) from face-to-face engagement despite likely traffic, noise, visual and fire impacts.
- 3. Residents renting homes within 2 km of the project site were not included in the project briefings and did not receive any formal notification letter, despite being directly affected by the development.
- 4. No open community forums were convened, limiting broader community participation.
- 5. The briefing sessions themselves were inadequate. Venn Energy representatives were unable to answer fundamental questions regarding project scale, footprint, buffer zones, fencing, and mitigation strategies. Responses were vague or dismissive, no follow-up was offered, and unprofessional comments were directed at a visibly distressed landholder, demonstrating a lack of empathy and respect.
- 6. Transparency was also lacking. Records of the meeting were not intended to be shared with landholders and were only provided after repeated requests.
- Critical project information was not available on the proponent's website, and the short timeframe between notification and the session left residents without reasonable access to information

## Objection 8 – Ineffective Dedicated Project Email and Enquiry Line

 The enquiry line and dedicated email did not provide timely or transparent responses to landholder questions and concerns. Enquiries were either left unanswered, responded to with vague or generic statements, or redirected back to the website. Compounding this, the

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enquiry phone line was only available between 9 am and 5 pm on weekdays, which excluded many working residents from being able to access it.

- This lack of responsiveness undermines the purpose of establishing such communication channels and demonstrates a failure to meet the requirements of the Community and Stakeholder Engagement Guidelines for State Significant Projects (DPE, 2022), which emphasise open, accessible, and responsive engagement processes.
- As a result, the dedicated project contact points have not served their intended purpose of enabling clear communication with the community and stakeholders, and instead further eroded trust in the engagement process.

## Objection 9 – Deficiencies in Project Website

- 1. Highly impacted adjoining landholders were told at the project briefing sessions that information about the project was available on the website.
- The Boree Solar Project website was non-operational at the time of the project briefing sessions, displaying firstly information from the Lumbruk Solar Project, then followed by a blank screen for a number of weeks; then a project website holding page was implemented.
- 3. The project website holding page consisted of only high-level text and a general project description. Critically, it failed to provide basic engagement tools such as a labelled site map, a Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) section, and a formal complaint handling process. For a project of this scale and classification under the NSW planning system, these omissions significantly undermined transparency, accessibility, and public trust particularly during the early stages of community consultation.
- 4. This meant that affected residents and stakeholders who were directed to the site for further information could not access any project details.
- 5. The Venn Energy corporate website contained only four short lines of generic technical information, which did not provide adequate context or address specific community concerns.
- 6. Relying on a non-functional or incomplete website as a primary information source falls well short of the Community and Stakeholder Engagement Guidelines for State Significant Projects (DPE, 2022), which require accessible, accurate, and timely information to be made available. The absence of a working website denied the community an essential channel for obtaining reliable information, reviewing materials in advance of consultation sessions, or tracking project updates. This deficiency significantly undermines the credibility and transparency of the engagement process.

## 7.4 PHASE TWO – CONTINUED COMMUNICATIONS AND ENGAGEMENT TO INFORM THE PREPARATION OF THE EIS

**Statement 4:** Phase Two engagement will be agreed as part of the Community and Stakeholder Engagement Plan and be informed by the SEARs and early engagement, but is likely to include the following: Regular Project newsletters; Regular website updates, including updates to general Project FAQs; Community and stakeholder correspondence at key Project milestones; Project fact sheets available at key Project milestones; Community drop-in information session/s; Community information webinar; Adjacent landowner briefings; Stakeholder meetings and briefings; Continued Project enquiry phone line and email and Government agency, Council and Service provider consultation.

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### Objection 10 - General objection – Phase Two consultation

We wish to register our objection to the conduct of Phase Two consultation to date. Although Phase Two has only just commenced, several concerns have already emerged:

- The community newsletter contained no meaningful updates or substantive information. It consisted primarily of:
  - o A summary of the project that simply repeated information already on the website.
  - A project location map that was identical to the map included in the initial notification letter (a letter many residents mistook for junk mail).
  - o A brief note about a meeting with Dubbo Regional Council.
  - o Notification that the scoping report is now available.
  - o Introduction of a new community engagement manager, Bree Williams. Affected landholders had been liaising with Bree a month prior to the newsletter being published.
  - An infographic about the planning process, identical to the one previously provided at the project briefing session.
- 2. The newsletter also claimed the community had been advised of an increase in BESS capacity. In reality, this advice was only sent to those who had subscribed to the newsletter, and it was contained within an email titled "project website now live". This selective notification practice excludes many affected stakeholders and demonstrates poor transparency.
- The newsletter was released without including the dates when the engagement team would be in the area, despite the fact those dates were already known at the time. Withholding this information significantly limited the opportunity for landholders and residents to prepare or participate.
- 4. Consultation continues to be narrowly targeted, with proponents phoning selected landholders to arrange private meetings rather than providing open and transparent engagement opportunities.
- 5. A request to meet with the representative of an affected landholder (while the landholder was on annual leave) was refused. This demonstrates a lack of flexibility and good faith, and further undermines procedural fairness by excluding legitimate representation.

These practices indicate that Phase Two is already repeating the same patterns of selective, inadequate, and opaque engagement seen during Phase One, rather than addressing the significant deficiencies previously raised.

## 7.5 COMMUNITY LEAD ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITIES

## Objection 11 – Misrepresentation of Community-led Engagement Activities

 Section 5.5 of the Scoping Report outlines community-led engagement activities, including the formation of the STOP BOREE SOLAR FARM AT GEURIE action group and Facebook page, the

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community information session at Geurie Racecourse Recreation Ground, and several petitions opposing the project.

- While these activities are genuine and reflect the strength of community concern, they are not
  evidence of the proponent undertaking meaningful engagement. Instead, they arose as a
  direct response to the lack of transparency, inclusivity, and proactive consultation by Venn
  Energy.
- 3. The STOP BOREE SOLAR FARM AT GEURIE action group and Facebook page is the community objecting to the project.
- By presenting these community-led initiatives within the Scoping Report, the proponent risks
  creating a misleading impression that broad engagement was facilitated or supported by the
  project team.
- 5. Under the Community and Stakeholder Engagement Guidelines for State Significant Projects (DPE, 2022), the responsibility for early and genuine consultation rests with the applicant, not the community. Reliance on community-led activities to demonstrate engagement is therefore inappropriate and does not satisfy the requirements of the SSD framework.

## 7.6 GOVERNMENT AT OTHER STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT

## Objection 12 – Less than adequate government and stakeholder engagement

- The stakeholder engagement outlined in the scoping report is inadequate, selective, and fails to demonstrate genuine consultation as required under the NSW Department of Planning's Engagement Guidelines for State Significant Projects (2022).
- 2. The majority of the recorded engagement consisted of sending project introduction emails to various stakeholders, including Dubbo Regional Council, the Local Aboriginal Land Council, federal and state members of parliament and other government agencies.
- 3. Such one-way communication does not provide meaningful two-way engagement or opportunities for affected communities to participate in discussions.
- 4. This approach is inconsistent with the requirement for early, inclusive, and transparent engagement under the SEARs and undermines the principles of fairness and accessibility in the planning process.

## Objection 13 – Misrepresentation of AEIC involvement and ongoing complaints case<sup>14</sup>

- The scoping report's statements that project briefings were held with the Australian Energy Infrastructure Commissioner (AEIC) are misleading and incomplete.
- 2. Venn Energy frames the Commissioner's involvement as routine consultation about project details, timeframes, engagement processes, and complaints management. However, this presentation omits the critical fact that Venn Energy currently has an active case before the AEIC, arising from multiple community complaints regarding poor consultation, inadequate information provision, and lack of responsiveness to affected landholders.

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- 3. As confirmed in the AEIC's open letter dated 3 July 2025, the Commissioner is actively engaged with both the proponent and community representatives in direct response to these complaints and continues to monitor the project closely.
- 4. By characterising these briefings as voluntary updates, the proponent downplays the seriousness of the complaints and misrepresents the true nature of the AEIC's role, which is not incidental but rather a direct result of significant community concern and regulatory intervention.
- 5. The selective description misleads decision-makers and the public by portraying a complaints process as though it were evidence of good engagement practice. This mischaracterisation undermines transparency and accuracy in the scoping report and must be formally recognised as a deficiency in the consultation record.

## 7.7 OTHER COMMUNICATION AND CONSULTATION CONCERNS

### Objection 14 – Expanded BESS Capacity and New Infrastructure Not Properly Communicated

- 1. The project description has materially changed between the initial notification letter (27 March 2025) and the scoping report now on exhibition.
- The letter advised residents that the Boree Solar Project would include a Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) with an indicative capacity of 150 MW / 600 MWh, whereas the scoping report identifies a significantly larger 200 MW / 800 MWh BESS, together with a new 132 kV collector substation and connection to the existing 132 kV network.
- 3. These changes represent a substantial increase in infrastructure and potential impacts, yet the community was not transparently notified of these alterations through a dedicated update or community meeting.
- 4. Instead, the changes have only become evident through the scoping documentation, which undermines the principle of early and transparent engagement required under the Engagement Guidelines for State Significant Projects (2022).
- 5. This inconsistency raises concerns about the accuracy and reliability of the proponent's consultation material and demonstrates a lack of procedural fairness in informing the community about the scale and nature of the development.
- 6. Highly impacted adjoining neighbours have not had any input into the layout of the infrastructure.

## Objection 15 - Incomplete Capture of Community Complaints in Scoping Report

- 1. The reliance on an inconsistent auto-generated email response system highlighted a serious failure in communication by Venn Energy.
- 2. Critical information, including the arbitrary cut-off date of 9 May for community feedback (to be included in scoping report), was not proactively communicated to the broader Geurie and Wongarbon communities, nor published on the project website.
- 3. Instead, residents were only made aware of this deadline if they happened to email the "Community Consultation Team" and, even then, the auto-response was not consistently issued.
- 4. This ad hoc approach created a situation where many residents remained uninformed unless they initiated contact, which undermined the principles of accessibility, transparency, and procedural fairness required under the NSW Engagement Guidelines for State Significant Projects (2022).

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- 5. Furthermore, the auto-response failed to clarify how feedback submitted after 9 May would be treated, leaving uncertainty about whether late submissions would be disregarded.
- 6. As a result, not all community complaints and sentiment were captured in the scoping report, meaning the consultation record presented is incomplete and does not accurately reflect the breadth of community concern.
- 7. This lack of clarity and inconsistency in communication practices eroded trust and demonstrated a failure to provide the community with reliable and timely information.

## Objection 16 - Unprofessional Conduct of Community Engagement Manager

- The conduct of the Community Stakeholder Engagement Manager during Peter Reardon's Boree Solar Project briefing demonstrated unprofessional and inappropriate behaviour. <sup>15</sup>
- 2. When landholder Peter Reardon, who was visibly distressed, raised questions about the project, the manager responded by saying, "I don't like the way you look at me, and what you do with your mouth," and accused him of being aggressive.
- 3. These comments were directed at a landholder who was upset about the impact of thousands of solar panels surrounding his property, not at the individuals present.
- 4. Rather than showing empathy or professionalism, the manager reacted defensively and dismissively, displaying a lack of emotional intelligence and maturity expected of someone leading a consultation process.
- 5. This behaviour compounded the stress of the meeting, discouraged open dialogue, and undermined trust in the engagement process. SSD guidelines require proponents to ensure the community are provided with safe, respectful, and inclusive opportunities to express views.

### Objection 17 - Failure to Honour Commitments to Affected Landholders

- Venn Energy failed to uphold commitments made to affected landholders, including Mr. Peter Reardon and Ms Robyn Hicks.
- 2. In correspondence dated 12 June 2025, the engagement team had assured Mr Reardon that he would be prioritised for an in-person meeting during the next site visit.
- 3. Despite Mr Reardon's written request to confirm dates, and further assurances provided on 19 June 2025, the team subsequently visited the local area without notifying him or arranging the promised meeting.
- 4. This demonstrated a clear disregard for commitments given and undermined trust in the consultation process.
- 5. Similarly, Ms Hicks, an affected landholder who had openly raised her declining mental health and PTSD related to the project, was only contacted by phone and was not proactively offered a faceto-face meeting. This was a missed opportunity to show care and respect for a vulnerable resident.

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6. The conduct of the proponent contradicted its assurances of improving consultation practices, demonstrated a lack of compassion towards directly affected residents, and reflected poorly on its commitment to transparent and respectful community engagement.

### Objection 18 – General objections to the Community and Stakeholder Engagement Plan

The Community and Stakeholder Engagement Plan mirrors the information contained in the Eco Logical Australia 2025, Boree Solar Farm Scoping Report, prepared for Venn Energy Pty Ltd; however, the following objections are lodged:

- The report states that Dubbo Regional Council (DRC) received an introductory letter/email and a
  copy of the community survey, yet Mayor Josh Black has confirmed that he did not receive such
  correspondence. Regardless of the reason, Venn Energy failed to follow up with Council to ensure
  that critical stakeholders were properly informed.
- 2. The potential interests identified for DRC omit key issues such as social impact, housing, road infrastructure, and the mental health and wellbeing of the community.
- The scoping documentation claims that maps were provided to affected landholders as part of
  project notification. In reality, only one unclear map was distributed, and residents were required
  to telephone the proponent to request clearer mapping, which is inadequate for a project of this
  scale.

## Objection 19 - Misrepresentation of community objections as "concerns"

The Scoping Report repeatedly refers to issues raised by the community as "concerns." This choice of language is not neutral — it serves to downplay the seriousness and formal standing of the matters raised by residents, landholders, and stakeholders.

There is an important distinction between **concerns** and **objections** within planning processes. "Concerns" suggests a softer, less formal expression of unease or opinion. By contrast, "objections" are clear, direct statements of opposition that carry procedural weight and require proper consideration under NSW planning law and the State Significant Development (SSD) framework.

Community members have not merely expressed "concerns." They have submitted written objections, raised strong opposition during briefing sessions, escalated matters to the Australian Energy Infrastructure Commissioner, and voiced objections in the media. These actions constitute formal objections to the project — not simply "concerns." To reframe these objections as "concerns" is misleading and inconsistent with the Engagement Guidelines for State Significant Projects (2022), which require that proponents record and present stakeholder input in their own words, and demonstrate how that input has influenced project design.

By substituting the word "concerns" for "objections," Venn Energy has attempted to soften the record of community opposition. This undermines the transparency and integrity of the scoping process and has the effect of minimising the extent of resistance to the project. It also denies the community's right to have its opposition accurately acknowledged in planning documentation.

This approach is particularly problematic because objections to SSDs carry substantive implications:

- they can trigger further environmental assessment requirements,
- · they must be considered by the consent authority (the Department or, in some cases, the IPC), and

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• they can influence whether a project is approved, modified, or refused.

The deliberate choice to present community opposition as "concerns" therefore dilutes the procedural force of those objections and prejudices fair assessment.

For this reason, the Scoping Report should be corrected to accurately reflect that the issues raised by the community are formal objections, not merely "concerns." Failure to do so constitutes a misrepresentation of the consultation record and breaches the requirements of NSW planning and engagement guidelines.

## 8. CONCLUSION

The engagement practices undertaken by Venn Energy and described in the Boree Solar Farm Scoping Report are inadequate, misleading, and inconsistent with the NSW Department of Planning's Community and Stakeholder Engagement Guidelines for State Significant Projects (2022). The evidence presented demonstrates a pattern of selective outreach, poor communication, and misrepresentation of community and stakeholder involvement. Directly affected residents and neighbouring communities were excluded from genuine consultation opportunities, while Dubbo Regional Council and other key stakeholders were not properly informed or engaged.

The deficiencies identified including misleading use of community-led activities, inadequate surveys, inaccessible or incomplete communication channels, unprofessional conduct, and failure to honour commitments to landholders have eroded trust and credibility in the proponent's consultation process.

For these reasons, the Save Geurie – Stop Boree Solar Project group respectfully requests that the DPIE not rely on the current engagement narrative in its assessment of the scoping report. ## **BACKGROUND**

The Dubbo Regional Sports Council Playing Field Improvement Fund is outlined in Council's Financial Assistance Policy. The Fund supports local sporting clubs/associations in undertaking continued improvement projects at Council Sporting Facilities. Applications for funding are assessed by the Dubbo Regional Sports Council.

The Dubbo Regional Sports Council is a committee comprised of representatives from various sporting clubs and associated within the LGA. It promotes communication between stakeholders and has been operating for decades.

Dubbo Regional Council 2025/2026 budget has \$20,000 (GST exclusive) allocated to the Fund. The allocation may be offered over multiple rounds until it is exhausted or the financial year closes. Unspent funds are returned to Council.

Sporting clubs and associations may apply to the Dubbo Regional Sports Council for a co-contribution of up to 50% of eligible project costs, capped at \$20,000 (GST exclusive), to support the development of sporting facilities. Once completed, the facility becomes an asset owned by Dubbo Regional Council.

Since 2017, the Fund has assisted sporting facility projects totalling \$508,193 (GST Inclusive). It has contributed \$152,376 (GST Inclusive) while sporting clubs/associations have contributed \$196,817 (GST Inclusive). The remaining balance has been funded through successful grant applications.

## REPORT

The funding round was open for applications with two applications received one from Dubbo Touch Association and one from Dubbo District Cricket Association. The assessment panel involving the Dubbo Regional Sports Council Executive Committee assessed each application in line with the Fund's terms, conditions and guidelines.

# Lady Cutler Oval

The existing west cricket nets at Lady Cutler Oval are nearing the end of their usable life and no longer meet Australian Cricket standards. While they remain adequate for junior training, a refurbishment would enhance the facility to support senior cricket programs. The proposed upgrade includes the addition of two new nets, enabling senior teams to conduct extra training sessions and improving overall capacity.

#### Katrina Gibbs Oval

The installation of a water bubbler and refill station at Katrina Gibbs Oval will provide essential access to clean drinking water for both the public and participants in sporting activities, particularly during the warmer months. A similar facility is already in place at John McGrath Oval within the Riverbank Sporting Precinct, demonstrating the value and practicality of such infrastructure.

#### Outcome

The Dubbo Regional Sports Council Executive Committee reviewed applications from both the Dubbo Touch Association and the Dubbo District Cricket Association, determining that each met the essential eligibility criteria. Following this, the Committee evaluated the proposals based on factors such as value for money, overall merit, and alignment with future master planning.

After careful consideration, the Committee resolved to endorse the Dubbo District Cricket Association's proposal for the refurbishment of the Lady Cutler West cricket nets.

In accordance with this assessment and the formal motion passed by the Sports Council, the Dubbo District Cricket Association will be awarded \$20,000 (GST exclusive) from the Sports Council Playing Field Improvement Fund to support the refurbishment project.

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#### **BACKGROUND**

Dubbo Regional Council (DRC) operates 22 cemeteries across the region, including those in Dubbo, Wellington, and surrounding villages. These cemeteries serve not only as operational spaces for interment but also as places of cultural, historical, and community significance.

The master plans provide a practical long-term vision for the two most utilised Council-managed cemeteries, New Dubbo and Wellington. Each plan identifies and prioritises both immediate and future needs, guiding the sustainable expansion and lifespan of these important community assets.

Their development is closely aligned with Council's strategic direction as outlined in the 2025–2030 Cemeteries Action Plan, which sets out four key priorities:

- Governance and Compliance
- Improved Information and Connectivity
- Strategic Engagement
- Sustainable Growth

These priorities aim to ensure that cemetery services remain financially sustainable, compliant with legislation, and responsive to the evolving needs of the community.

# **REPORT**

The New Dubbo and Wellington Cemetery master plans have been developed by Locale Consulting to address the long-term interment needs of their respective communities. They incorporate:

- Expansion areas for future burial plots
- Enhanced landscaping and environmental features.
- Improved signage and wayfinding.
- Infrastructure upgrades including amenities and memorial gardens.

The master plans were developed as part of Council's Cemetery Improvement Project. This initiative aimed to foster community awareness and engagement around cemetery planning and management. Key objectives included:

- Aligning cemetery operations with legislation and best practice.
- Promoting cemeteries as public spaces that reflect community values.
- Gathering feedback to inform long-term planning.

Community input has been gathered through surveys, drop-in sessions, and stakeholder workshops. The 'YourSay' page served as a central hub for updates, resources, and public contributions, helping inform the final masterplan designs.

#### Consultation

The development of the New Dubbo and Wellington Cemetery master plans was informed by a comprehensive community and stakeholder engagement process conducted in June 2025. The consultation aimed to involve the community meaningfully in shaping the future of these important public spaces.

# **Engagement Activities**

- 24-day consultation period via Council's YourSay platform (6–30 June 2025).
- 213 visits to the project page and 380 social media engagements.
- Traditional media coverage including 1 media release, 2 newspaper ads, and 12 radio mentions.
- Industry workshop and public drop-in session held in Dubbo.
- Council staff session.
- Two email campaigns sent to project followers.

# Survey Participation

- 56 total survey responses: 31 for Wellington Cemetery and 25 for New Dubbo Cemetery.
- Respondents included residents, former residents, and individuals with family interred in the cemeteries.
- Age range of participants spanned from under 22 to over 85.

# **Key Themes from Community Feedback**

#### Wellington Cemetery

- Strong support for naturalised memorial areas and bushwalk-style features.
- High priority placed on flood safety, amenities, shade trees, and seating.
- Mixed views on natural burials, with 46.67% not interested and concerns about tree root impacts.
- Preferred cremation memorials included semi-formal gardens and memorial walls.
- Suggestions included rural-style fencing, levee for flood mitigation, and improved signage.

# New Dubbo Cemetery

- Support for dispersed native trees and formal tree planting layouts.
- Emphasis on amenities, water access, bins, and seating.
- 36% of respondents not interested in natural burials; some support for future consideration.
- Bushwalk-style memorials and semi-formal gardens were the most preferred cremation options.
- Feedback led to adjustments such as overflow parking, improved access to depot areas, and enhanced landscaping.

# Stakeholder Feedback

• Input was received from funeral directors, Council staff, and industry representatives.

- Consultant review highlighted strong alignment with community preferences.
- Minor revisions were made to masterplans based on feedback, including:
  - Redistribution of parking
  - Adjustments to entry points and depot locations
  - Consideration of long-term natural burial options without immediate implementation.

# **Resourcing Implications**

The implementation of the master plans will require a staged and coordinated allocation of resources across operational, capital, and strategic planning areas. While the masterplans themselves do not commit Council to immediate expenditure, they establish a framework for future investment aligned with community needs.

Council has already allocated \$150,000 per cemetery in the 2025/2026 budget to support the construction of amenities, which is a key priority. Additional capital works will include:

- Additional memorial infrastructure and signage upgrades.
- Environmental improvements, such as flood mitigation.
- Road upgrades and formalised parking.

# **OBJECTIVES**

Previous strategic planning, alongside more recent community and industry consultation, have informed the development of this Master Plan. The Master Plan addresses a series of issues and opportunities based on the following objectives:

- Respecting and building on the existing layout and use of the cemetery whilst seeking to provide improved internal connections

#### Maintenance

Outcomes of this Master Plan recognise that the cemetery is a 'forever' space. Decisions about infrastructure and planting that are taken now will strongly influence Council's ongoing perpetual maintenance costs. Minimising these costs through the use of robust, natural and native materials and plantings will assist in reducing these long-term costs, meaning more effective maintenance and a lower-cost service.





#### **Environmental enhancement**

Consistent with overarching community sentiment, the protection of existing trees and the integration of more natural elements into the site is central to the Master Plan. This includes the provision of consistent native species planting selections, increasing tree planting to create shade and a more natural setting and the integration of interment opportunities that connect to these spaces.

Previously Roman Catholic section.

#### I. Works sheds

Area for storage of on-site works equipment. Potential to formalise as a well landscaped/screened 'back of house' activities area including stockpiling etc.

#### Open Area

Open expansion area with various informal tracks and apparent stockpiling of soil. Electricity transmission lines located in western extents.

#### OVERVIEW

#### A. Central Entry / Exit

Simplify vehicle entry and exit to one intersection off Cobbora Road. This central entry allows multiple access points to be rationalised and for the service road to be replaced with any future Cobbora Road widening in the long term. Features signage and landscaping at site boundary.

#### B. Western Entr

Retained in the short / medium term as an exit only point.

#### C. Eastern Entry

Retained in the short / medium term as an exit only point.

#### D. New Central Entry Road

Entry road sets up symmetry of new radial road layout and incorporates connections with existing roads. Includes avenue planting and paths.

#### E. Memorial Garden

New memorial plant beds with connecting paths and furniture, incorporates columbarium walls, memorial edging, and other memorialisation elements. This area also includes new lawn beam burial space (approx. 250 plots) and a basic accessible amenities as a central facility.

#### F. Car Parking

New car park incorporating existing roadway to service western portions.

#### G. Future Cemetery Expansion Area and Road Layout

Radial layout of non-denominational concrete lawn beam burials with associated road layout and on-street parking. Also includes central path network, street trees, gardens, furniture and shade structures. (Potential for approx. 3000 plots).

#### H. Stage 2 Memorial Gathering Space and Western Buffer

Native planting buffer defines a central gathering space. Includes memorial pathways, memorial gardens, reflective seating areas, bush trail, relocated amenities, and a significant shelter / outdoor chapel located as a centre piece for the lone-term centery expansion.

#### I. Existing Avenue and Parking Area

Trees and roadway retained with additional parking on western side and connections to the radial road layout at both ends.

#### J. Stage 1 Native Memorial Area and Outdoor Chapel

Native planting buffer to eastern corner of site incorporating a memorial loop walk and bush trail. Also provides ceremony use with an outdoor shelter/ open chapel and accessible toilets.

#### K. Peace Section (Previously Roman Catholic)

Potential additional 286 plots.

#### L. Serenity Section (Previously Church of England). Potential additional 90 plots.

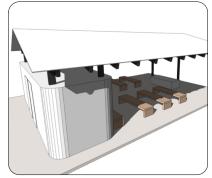

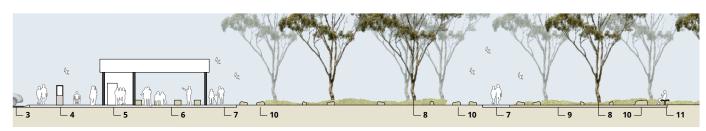

The Master Plan identifies key locations for site and directional signage, including at the site entry and main internal intersections. In addition to these, more specific directional signage will be provided to enable visitors to locate specific sites. Examples of these are provided below.

#### Maintenance

Outcomes of this Master Plan recognise that the cemetery is a 'forever' space. Decisions about infrastructure and planting that are taken now will strongly influence Council's ongoing perpetual maintenance costs. Minimising these costs through the use of robust, natural and native materials and plantings will assist in reducing these long-term costs, meaning more effective maintenance and a lower-cost service.





#### **Environmental enhancement**

Consistent with overarching community sentiment, the provision of additional trees, alongside the integration of natural elements into the site is central to the Master Plan. This includes the provision of consistent native species planting selections, increasing tree planting to create shade and a more natural setting and the integration of interment opportunities that connect to spaces.

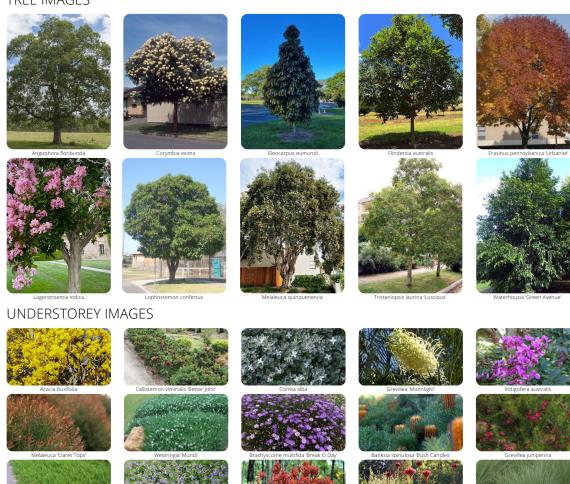
