

ASBESTOS DUMPING FORCES FACILITY CLOSURE



Dubbo Regional Council has closed the Elong Elong Waste Facility due to asbestos waste that was dumped at the site.

Council's Manager Solid Waste Mark Giebel said that it appears that the waste has come from a renovation and as it contains old tiles and sections of wall.

"People really need to be aware of the risks that asbestos poses and avoid playing renovation roulette," he said.

"As we come to the end of National Asbestos Awareness month, and the fact that one of the Waste Facilities in our LGA has been contaminated, it is timely for the community, including tradespeople and home renovators, to familiarize themselves with the NSW Heads of Asbestos Co-ordination Authorities (HACAs*) 4 Top Tips for safely managing asbestos during home maintenance, renovations and DIY.

Proper management of asbestos is important because of the significant impacts on your lungs that asbestos can cause in the longer term.

"Asbestos can be present in many houses and buildings built before 1987 and most people can't tell whether building

materials contain asbestos just by looking at them.

“Asbestos becomes a health risk when asbestos fibres are released into the air and breathed in. So it is important for everyone to take precautions and be aware of how to safely handle and dispose of asbestos” Mr Giebel said.

“Following these tips will help to ensure safety for everyone – tradies, DIY renovators and their families.”

1. BE AWARE - Is it there?

- If your house was built or renovated before 1987, it is highly likely to contain asbestos. Asbestos can occur in all sorts of places in the home, but especially in wet areas like bathrooms and kitchens. Get more information about where it can occur from here.
- If you're not sure, then play it safe and assume that you do have asbestos.
- If you want to be certain, then engage a Licensed Asbestos Assessor to tell you.

2. BE CAUTIOUS - No go, until you know!

- Treat all products containing any amount of asbestos as potentially dangerous if disturbed, and don't DIY it. Protect yourself and your family and use a Licensed Asbestos Removalist instead. They have the proper training to deal with asbestos safely.
- If you do decide to DIY small amounts of bonded asbestos, then make sure you know what to do and are prepared with the proper personal protective equipment.

3. BE SAFE – Safely dispose, don't expose

- Check the rules and dispose safely! It is critical that asbestos waste is wrapped properly and goes to properly licensed landfills, so that it does not cause a health risk to people in the community. It is illegal to dump asbestos waste.

4. BE CURIOUS -If in doubt, find out!

- You can find a list of landfills that can accept asbestos waste here, but always call ahead in case you need to book a time to drop it off.

Mr Giebel also said that with recent changes to legislation Council and EPA can now issue on the spot fines of \$15,000 for illegal transportation and disposal of asbestos, with maximum court imposed penalty of \$2 million.

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
